SWTSTC RECEIVES DANFORTH FOUNDATION GRANT

In the Spring of 1956, the Danforth Foundation invited thirty-one colleges over the United States to submit proposals for projects they would undertake in improving the quality of civil and moral leadership in the community served by the college if they were granted funds.

In July, SWTSTC was chosen as one of ten colleges to receive grants which would enable them to carry out such programs on the campus.

Work at the college is conducted in five areas: great issues lectures and siminars, family living, student leadership, improvement of the humanities program and improvement of dormitory living.

For 1957 the Great Issues Lectures and Seminars Committee decided to bring the most able speakers available to them on social science topics of revelance to life at mid-century. This committee sponsored Dr. Norwood Brigance, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, Dr. Henry S. Commager and Mr. Norman Cousins.

Dr. Henry A. Bowman was sponsored by the Committee on Family Living.

MRS ROOSEVELT held a press conference after her lecture on "World Concepts of Communism."



Dr. Henry A. Bowman, nationally known consultant on family and marriage problems, was brought to the college by the Danforth Grant committee on family living.

In addition to his February 12 lecture, Dr. Bowman spoke on "How the College Might Plan a Permanent Program in Improving Family Life" at an afternoon seminar.

Dr. Bowman, through his books, lectures and teachings, has become one of the foremost American authorities on the subject of marriage and the family. He is the author of two books, "Marriage for Moderns" and "The Family and You." In addition he has contributed chapters to a number of other books and has written articles for a number of popular and scientific journals.

Dr. Bowman took his PhD. at Yale University in 1931. He has taught at Stephens College, the University of Texas, the University of California and the University of Minnesota in addition to appearing as a guest lecturer at other colleges and universities over the country.

He served as educational consultant in the making of a series of films in correlation with his book, "Marriage for Moderns."

DR. HENRY A. BOWMAN, noted marriage authority, lectured on "Improving Family Living."


One of the most distinguished persons ever to visit the SWT campus, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt spoke on "World Concepts of Communism" in February before a capacity crowd in Evans Auditorium.

Second in a series of Great Issues speakers, Mrs. Roosevelt cautioned that the threat to our educational system is the greatest threat to the democracy of our time.

Since the death of her husband, Eleanor Roosevelt has maintained many of her interests, and on December 19, 1945, she was appointed by President Truman to the United States delegation to the UN General Assembly. She was unamiously elected chairman of the Commission on Human Rights of UNESCO in 1946.

Affectionately known as the "First Lady of the Land" for 13 years, Mrs. Roosevelt has also been called "The First Lady of the World" because of the international regard she has gained through her work in the United Nations.

She has edited My Day and India and the Awakening East in addition to several childrens' books. She is currently conducting a question-and-answer page for McCalls, If You Ask Me.



MR. NORMAN COUSINS, editor of "Saturday Review" was among the great issues speakers.

"The Making of Tomorrow" was the topic presented by Norman Cousins, Great Issues speaker who appeared on the Hill in the Spring.

Mr. Cousins as an interpreter or analyst of history-in-the-making has represented The Saturday Review, the National Broadcasting and the American Broadcasting Companies at such events as the Asian-African Conference at Bandung, Indonesia, in 1955, the East-West crisis in Germany in 1953; the Korean War in 1951; the Berlin Air Lift in 1948; and the Atomic Test Explosions at Bikini.

He has received degrees, bonoris causa from eleven colleges and universities. He is the recipient of the Thomas Jefferson Magazine Awards presented by the University of Illinois; the Tuition Plan Award for the Year's Outstanding Service to Education in 1952 and the Wayne State University Award in Education in 1956. Concerning his latter award, President Eisenhower, in a message to Wayne State University, described Mr. Cousins as a "distinguished editor who stands as a symbol of America's creative, crusading and sensitive mind."

"American Democracy at Mid-Century" was the theme of Henry Steele Commager's talk April 25.

Fourth and last in the series of Great Issues lecturers on the Hill this year, Dr. Commager is professor of American History at Amhurst College.

Listed in Who's Who in America, Dr. Commanger is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, national scholastic society.

He has edited Tocqueville's Democracy in America, A St. Nicholas Anthology, America in Perspective and The Rise of the American Nation. In addition, he is co-author of several other publications.




DR. HENRY STEELE COMMAGER, professor of American History at Amhurst College, discussed mid-century American democracy.




After winning her title at the Frontier Celebration last Spring, Nancy has reigned as Miss Southwest Texas State this year.

Known for her ever present smile and vivid personality, she has received a host of honors during her three years at SWTSC.



The club participated with the Harris Blairs and the Kiwanis Club in the campus safety campaign.






































The game did not count toward the championship since Howard Payne was a new member of the Lone Star Conference and did not become eligible for conference until 1957.




After an exchange of the ball, the Bobcat passing attack was put into gear by quarterback Bobby McBride. A ten yard aerial to Charlie Hall netted

Javelina halfback, Joe Ormand booted an 18 yard field goal in the last three minutes to fix the final score at 23-14 in favor of A&I.







The Cats returned home after the A&I defeat and handed out a rude welcoming a week later to the visiting Sul Ross Lobos by romping to a 27-0 victory.


Bobcat scoring started early in the first period when halfback Eddie Lankford burst through for 65 yards and the Bobcats were out front 7-0.

Southwest Texas scored two more times in the first half, on a 45 yard pass and run shot from Pee-Wee Woods to End Vollie Williams and a four yard


keeper play by quarterback Terry Darden. Sanders made good one of the two tries for the point leaving the score 20-0 at halftime.

The Cats last score came in the fourth period with Lankford driving over from 11 yards out. Billy Miller booted the point. The score stood 27-0.







The Bobcats spotted the Redbird's coming 6-0 lead in the second quarter when Tech halfback Rench drove over for the score. The point was no good.





CATS STOP ETBC, ENTER NAIA PLAY




The Bobcats won the right to enter the tournament by defeating ETBC in Marshall by a margin of 86-70.


Bobcats Win, Lose To East Texas Lions


