The 1961 Pedagog promises to be one of the finest yearbooks we have ever published. We are thankful to the Editor and his staff for this fine publication.


We know that many hours of careful planning and arduous work were required in the production of the Pedagog.


FRESHMAN WEEK



Students then hurry up to the Lair to buy their necessary books and find another line greeting them upon their arrival.


After the Lair and the book line the student then rushes over to the cafeteria to begin another tiring process, standing in line to eat dinner.

Whatever the SWT student finds to do with his leisure time, you may be certain it will be fun.





At 7 p.m. November 4, Homecoming officially began when the bonfire was lighted to start the pep rally.


A cool, crisp evening helped to make the crowd large and responsive as the band and cheerleaders led yells during the burning of the bonfire.







BASKETBALL SEASON


As football season ends, the basketball fever hits Southwest Texas. This is a yearly epidemic that invades the campus in December and remains throughout the winter.

As the season ends, the epidemic leaves the campus for another year but always promising to return another year.






Ferlin Husky was the highlight of the Frontier Days dance. This dance was the closing event that ended the very successful weekend.



In the 1960-61 school year, members of the Choir elected Norma Lynne Nolen and Erwin Lang as its "favorites."












The Student Religious Council at Southwest Texas State College was organized to give students of all religious faiths on the campus an opportunity to work together to encourage religious participation of all members of the college community.

Members of the council endeavor to promote an awareness of the place of religion on the SWT campus and to stimulate interest of the student body in religious group activities, and in active support of their own churches.







AIMS OF THE BSU AT SWT


1. BSU confronts the Baptist collegian with the rightful claims of Christ on his life.

3. It enables the student to meet the challenge of materialistic skepticism and strengthens his faith in the face of intellectual problems.
4. It provides Christian fellowship which stimulates enduring friendships.
5. To encourages scholarship as a part of effective Christian witnessing.
6. It develops Christian leadership through a well-organized campus program.
7. It magnifies Christian citizenship and world responsibility.

To summarize: The Baptist Student Union is a denominational ministry to college campuses. Its purpose is to conserve and train Southern Baptist students for effective Christian discipleship. 



Johnny Tombs, three-year letterman at guard, was placed on the second-team all-Lone Star Conference selections.


Lowe Irvine, senior guard from San Antonio has been a starter for three years. One of the most dependable performers

on the squad, Irvine proved his ability on both defense and offense. Honorable mention, LSC.


Willard Dearing, a unanimous first-team selection on the Lone Star Conference team of 1951, received honorable mention this year. Dearing was tops on pass defense.

Hillyer Ward, senior halfback, played fine defensive ball for SWT in addition to being one of the leading ball carriers for the Bobcats.






Bobcats Outscore U.C.C. 15-6





SWT Fumbles Spell Defeat

EVANS FIELD, Oct. 1—Southwest Texas State's Bobcats, afflicted with a bad case of fumblitis, fell 20-7 to the Sul Ross Lobos here tonight. The Bobcats were first to score, driving from their own 48-yard line to a touchdown in 12 plays.

Cats Drop Squeaker to McM








Bobcats Batter SFA 17-0





Jackets Sting Cats 18-0









Javelinas Rip Bobcats 35-0

EVANS FIELD, Nov. 19—The Texas A&I Javelinas slammed Southwest Texas State 35-0 in the Bobcat's final game of 1960, to ring down the curtain on SWT's most dismal football season since 1938. A&I's national champion Javelinas stunned some 2,000 "Parent's Day" fans as well as the Bobcats with a methodical march to a touchdown the first time they got the ball. Late in the first quarter, the Javelinas produced a carbon copy of their first march to score again. Midway in the second quarter, Southwest Texas finally mounted a goalward drive, but after two first downs the Bobcats fumbled the ball back to Texas A&I.

After an exchange of punts, the Javs made their third touchdown but missed the extra point and it was 20-0. Early in the third period, the Hogs sloshed down the muddy field for another TD and ran across the extra point to push the count to 28-0. After being set back by a 15-yard penalty, Texas A&I ripped to its final touchdown to end the scoring at 35-0. Southwest Texas State's only serious threat came in the fourth quarter when Robby Robinett intercepted a Javelina pass and returned it 25 yards to the A&I 20.





BOBCAT BASKETBALL, 1960-61

Southwest Texas State's 1961 basketball team had a big pair of shoes to fill—those of the 1960 national champion Bobcats. After losing four regulars—including NAIA All-Americans Charlie Sharp and Rudy Davalos—off the 1960 squad, Coach Milton Jowers rebuilt the SWT crew into a hustling, snarling pack of Bobcats that achieved far greater success than anyone expected. The "new look" Bobcats built up a 12-3 record before hitting a slight slump in Lone Star Conference action at mid-season. They lost five LSC games to drop out of the conference title picture, but put on a strong surge to win their last six league games and finish third. With the two top teams—Lamar Tech and Stephen F. Austin—ineligible for NAIA competition, the Bobcats represented the LSC in the national playoffs for the third straight year. They downed Pan American twice for the District IV berth and advanced to the quarterfinals before Western Michigan gunned them down, 80-75. Coach Jowers closed his record book with 287 wins and 105 defeats, and turned over the basketball reins to Vernon McDonald. Jowers will become head football coach in September.






Cards Rip Cats






Guard Bobby Henson leaps high above the defending Sul Ross Lobos to launch his favorite one-handed jump shot from the right of the bucket.




Cats Down Kats in Fading Seconds



HPC Falls 80-68



Broncs Busted








Henson battles for the ball against Central Connecticut




Another shot from the opening game in Municipal Auditorium at Kansas City shows determination on faces of both Bobcats and Blue Devils.






The Women's Recreation Association at Southwest Texas State College promotes recreational activities for women through clubs, tournaments, special events, and intercollegiate activities.


