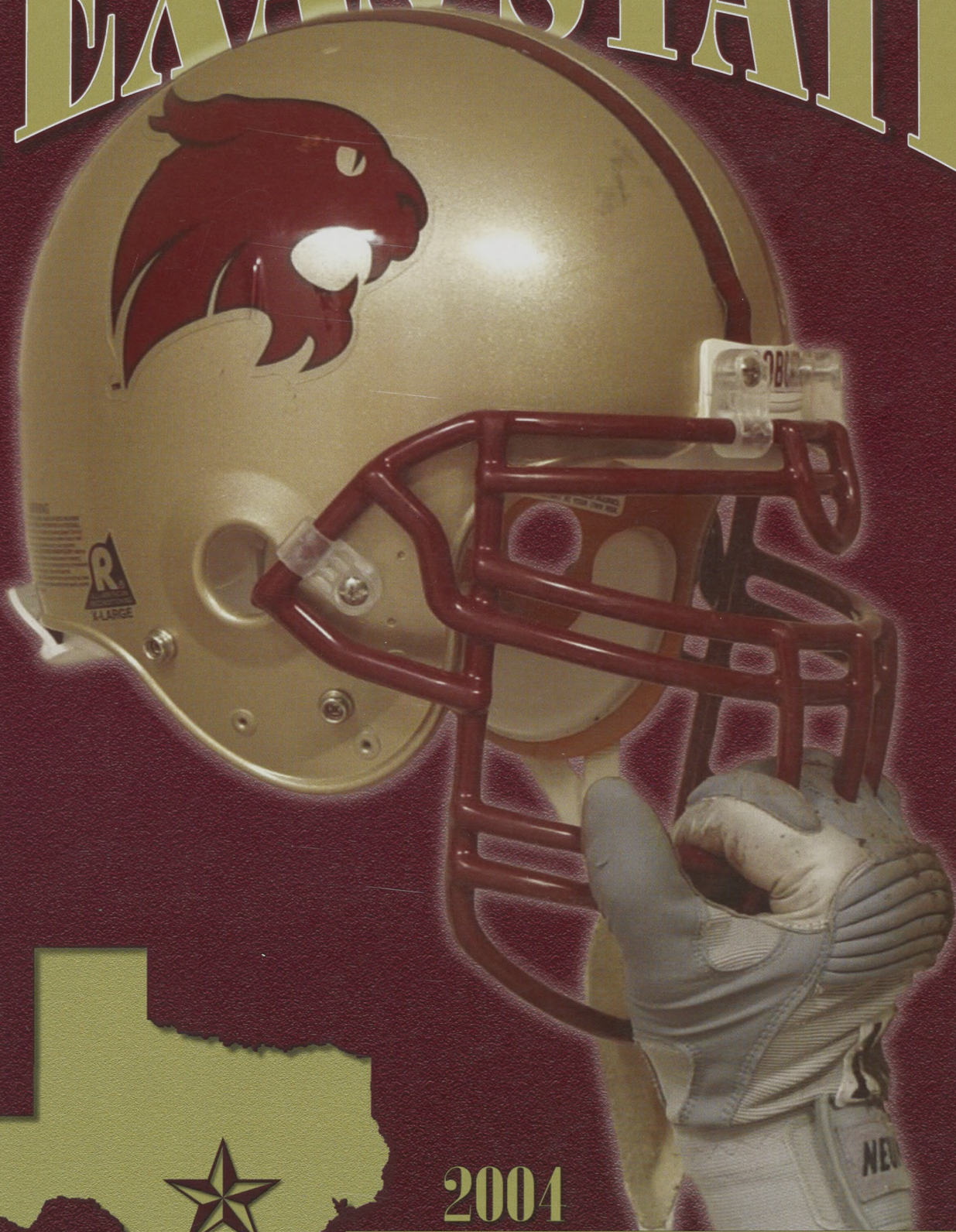
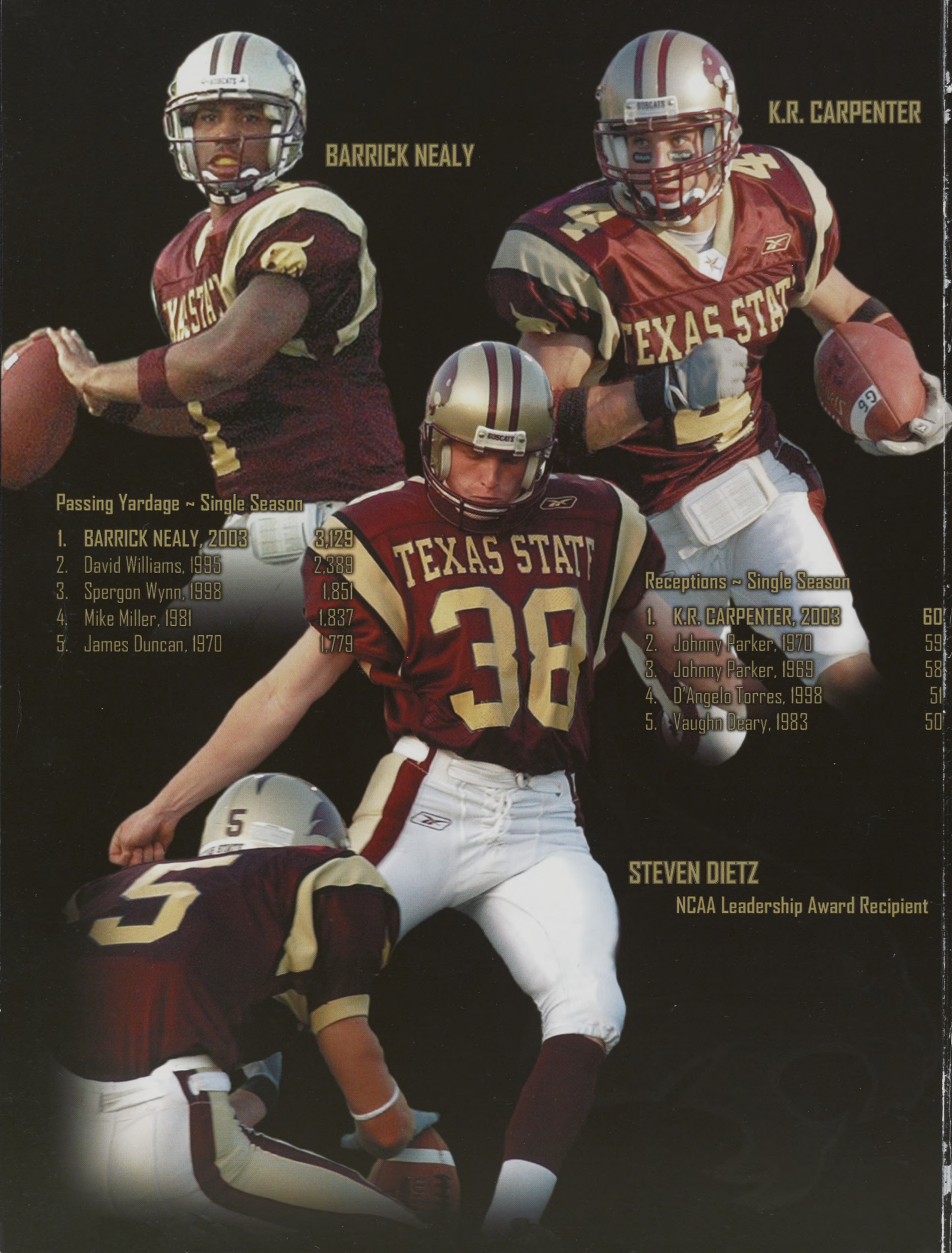

ON RADIO

Texas State University can be heard on 89.9 FM, KTSW this fall as the Bobcats embark on an impressive 11-game schedule. KTSW, the Texas State campus station, will air all regular season and any post-season games the Bobcats qualify for this fall.

Texas State University athletics and KTSW will set the talent for the fall in the coming weeks as longtime analyst Bill Culhane will be a part of the three-person crew, as will KTSW student announcers. Official personnel decisions have yet to be finalized.

All games will be streamed on the internet via Boostercast.com.

ON TELEVISION

After appearing on television three times last fall, the Bobcats of Texas State expect similar coverage during the 2004 football season. The Southland Conference had a total of 17 televised games last year.

The key player in the packages being negotiated is Fox Sports Net Southwest. The 'Cats have appeared on the regional network numerous times in the past several years, including twice last fall, at home against McNeese State and at Nicholls State the following week. Both were Thursday night broadcasts.

covering the 'cats

The 2004 edition of the Texas State Football Yearbook has been produced to assist you in covering the Bobcats. Additional information, including media releases, photographs and statistics are available upon request. Please make sure you are familiar with the media policies of the Bobcats which follow.

BOBCAT STADIUM

The Texas State Football press box is located on the west side of Bobcat Stadium. The media entrance is located at Gate One. That entrance is also used for WILL CALL pick-up of passes. Parking is located on the west side of the stadium, as well, for media with proper credentials.

COVERING PRACTICE

Practice sessions are open to the media and have a usual starting time of 3:30 p.m. Media are encouraged to contact the Athletic Media Relations office to arrange easy access to players and coaches prior to the start of practice.

GAME CREDENTIALS

Credentials for Texas State home games are issued for working media only and must be requested, preferably well in advance. Credentials will be mailed when time allows, otherwise they will be left at WILL CALL.

OFFICES

The Texas State Athletic Media Relations office is located in the new Strahan Coliseum Administrative Wing in rooms 121 and 122. Normal hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

PHONE INTERVIEWS

The Athletic Media Relations office would prefer media members to arrange all phone interviews a day in advance to make scheduling easier. Most player phone requests will be returned between 2:15 p.m. and 2:45 p.m. No telephone interviews are allowed on game days.

PHOTO PASSES

Only photographers on assignment from a periodical will be issued credentials. Photographers are requested to abide by guidelines set forth by the NCAA on shooting limitations on the sidelines. Those not complying with the guidelines may be removed.

POST GAME INTERVIEWS

Following the game, Head Coach David Bailiff and a number of players, chosen by the media, will be available for interviews in the End Zone Complex interview area. Media will be taken to the room following the game by the Athletic Media Relations staff. The Texas

State locker room will not be open to the media prior to or after the game.

SCOUTING PASSES

Requests made for scouting purposes should be made in advance to the Texas State Athletic Media Relations office and must conform to NCAA policies.

STATISTICS/SERVICES

Packets, including statistics, pre-game notes and media guides, will be available in the press box prior to the game. Quarter, halftime, final stats and a running play-by-play will be provided to all media. In addition, food is provided prior to kickoff and soft drinks are available throughout the contest.

TELEPHONES

There are a limited number of telephone lines for use in the main media area. A fax machine is also available upon prior notice.

There will be one courtesy line available for the visiting team's "official" radio station. Stations or writers wishing to have another line installed should make their own arrangements through Texas State University Telephone Services at 512-245-2525.

TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY - SAN MARCOS

Texas State University-San Marcos, a member of the Texas State University System, was founded as Southwest Texas Normal School in 1899 to prepare teachers for the public schools of Texas. Its doors opened in 1903 with 303 students and 17 faculty members. In its first century, it has grown into a major doctoral-granting institution, nationally recognized in many areas, with 26,366 students, 1,000 faculty and more than 100,000 graduates.

Academics/Faculty

◆ Still honoring its founding as a teachers college, Texas State certifies more teachers than any other school in Texas. It is recognized by the Association of Teacher Educators as one of the top three teacher education programs in the country and is headquarters for the National Center for School Improvement, the Texas School Safety Center and other education initiatives to meet the challenges of public education today.

◆ The Geography Department has been ranked the largest and one of the best programs in the nation for many years by the Association of American Geographers.

◆ The university's first Ph.D.s (two in geography) were awarded in May 2000. The Coordinating Board praised the university for the manner in which it sought its doctoral programs - to build on already successful undergraduate and graduate programs - and fast-tracked a third geography Ph.D. based on the outstanding success of the first two. Texas State now has three Ph.D. programs in geography (environmental geography, geographic education and geographic information science), two in education (school improvement and adult, professional and community education) and our most recent in aquatic resources.

◆ Annual external grant expenditures, which totaled less than \$2 million in the late '80s, are now \$20.6 million.

◆ Faculty members in geography, communication studies, business, mathematics and mass communication have been recognized as the best in the nation in their fields. Twelve faculty members have been honored as Piper Professors, an annual recognition of the top college faculty in the state.

◆ The Texas State MathWorks Summer Program received one of five Texas Higher Education Star Awards for exemplary programs to close the educational gaps that challenge the state. Its creator was one of 10 individuals in the nation honored by President Bush for remarkable results in increasing the participation of minorities and women in science, math and engineering.

◆ The physics program was one of five in the nation cited by the American Physical Society for innovation in preparing students for good jobs; others were MIT, LSU, Rutgers and Morehead State.

◆ The technology curriculum is designed to produce a qualified workforce for the high-tech industry, with programs in manufacturing engineering and semiconductor manufacturing. The new Mitte Complex, which opened in fall 2003, includes a state-of-the-art microchip fabrication facility.

◆ The creative writing program in the College of Liberal Arts is quickly earning a national reputation. It was cited by Associated Writing Programs as "a dynamic program, one that will establish SWT (now Texas State) as a regional-and very likely national-center for the literary arts."

Students

◆ Texas State's admission standards are among the highest in the state for public institutions. Standards increased dramatically in 1992, causing enrollment to level off for several years; however, student numbers have set records the last four fall semesters. Today, almost all incoming freshmen graduated in the top half of their high school class, compared with three-quarters of them in 1988; more than half are from the top quarter of their classes, compared with 35% in 1988.

◆ Texas State is the third most popular choice of colleges for Texas students who apply electronically (about half of students apply on-line).

◆ The retention rate of freshmen is now 76%, up from 57% in the late '80s.

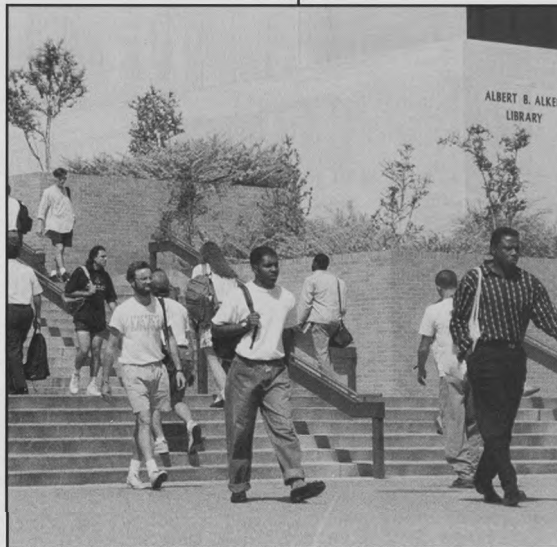
◆ Student teams in debate, advertising and free enterprise routinely compete nationally and place in the top five; the Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) team won the international competition in 2000 vying against over 700 teams from 15 countries; the American Advertising Federation student team placed second in nationals from a field of over 250 universities in 2001.

◆ Texas State students in jazz, marching and concert band, symphony, choirs, instrumental ensembles, mariachis and steel drum band maintain schedules of performances across the state and the world; the jazz program has been featured for 10 years at the Montreux (Switzerland) Jazz Festival.

General

◆ Texas State is the lead institution in the Round Rock Higher Education Center serving North Austin and Williamson County that opened in 1998. Enrollment is nearing 1,500, having grown by 40% from fall 2001 to fall 2002.

◆ This university's first capital campaign concluded in 1999, raising a total of \$74.6 million on a goal of \$60 million. Annual private gifts now total \$15 million, compared to about a half million dollars in 1988. In that time the endowment has increased from \$15 million to \$55 million.

SAN MARCOS, TEXAS

San Marcos is located in the southeastern part of Hays County and serves as county seat for 670 square miles. Its proximity to the headwaters of the San Marcos River played a great part in the development of the city. The unusual river, according to legend, was discovered by a group of Franciscan Monks in 1790 on St. Mark's Day. They honored the patron saint by naming the river in his honor.

The new County of Hays -- named after Captain Jack Hays, a noted Indian fighter and Texas Ranger -- was founded on March 1, 1848.

The city and the university have been in partnership from the beginning. The citizens of San Marcos put up the capital to purchase the land that was donated to the State of Texas to create Southwest Texas State School in 1899.

San Marcos is 30 miles south of Austin and 45 miles north of San Antonio on Interstate 35. The scenic beauty is an asset that makes San Marcos different from other towns.

The land to the east of the city is commonly referred to as blackland prairie and is made of rich, fertile soil. To the west is the steeply rolling and limestone cliff Hill Country.

Summers are very warm (96 degree average) while Spring and Fall are mild. Winters are usually not severe and are short lived (53 degree average). The average yearly rainfall is 35.6 inches with a growing season of 254 days, and Hays County elevation ranges from 600 to 1,600 feet above sea level.



AMBIENCE

Natives and newcomers alike find a wonderful environment in which to work and play. The centerpiece of San Marcos is the remarkable spring-fed San Marcos River that meanders through the city between park-lined banks. Historic districts include the National Register Districts of Belvin Street and the Courthouse Square.

SHOPPING

San Marcos offers the best in shopping opportunities from serious shopping to browsing. The historic Courthouse Square area offers a potpourri of shops referred to as the Texas Natural marketplace, while the Prime Outlets of San Marcos and Tanger Factory Outlet Center are some of the busiest shopping areas in the state. In addition, located strategically throughout town are various shopping centers including Springtown Center, San Mar Plaza, San Marcos Place, Nelson Center and Papillon Village.



OUTDOOR RECREATION

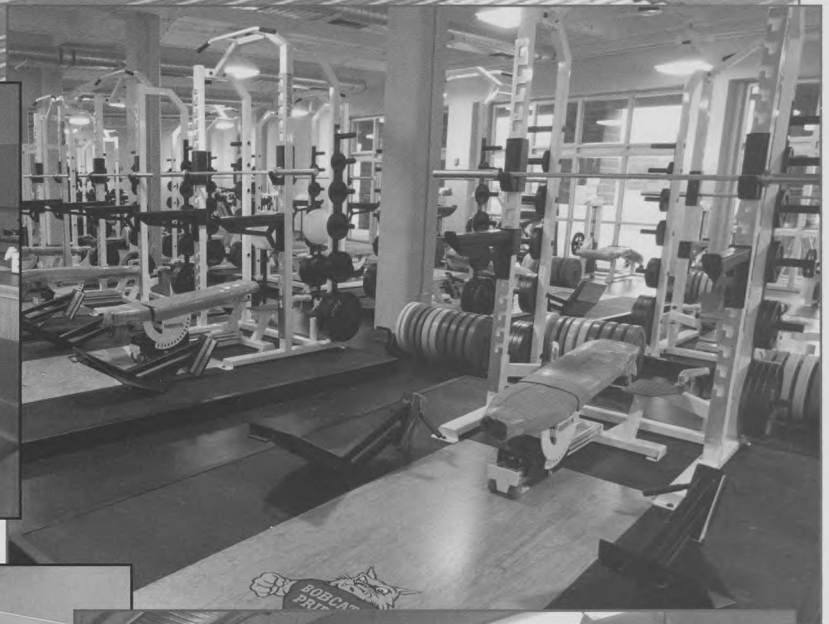
The San Marcos River is the focus of many parks which form a green belt through the city. Picnic areas, recreation buildings, an olympic-sized swimming pool, tennis courts, baseball fields, and one of the largest Playscapes in the nation are sprinkled throughout the city's nine parks. Outdoor recreation is a way of life in San Marcos' inviting climate.

SPECIAL EVENTS

It seems as though there is always a celebration in San Marcos. Spring events include Carnival! in February; the Bluebonnet Kite Festival in April; Historic Home Tour; Viva! Cinco de Mayo and the Texas Natural Weekend in May. Summer events include the Texas Water Safari in June and the San Marcos Performing Arts Association's free Summer in the Park concert series June through August. Finally, the Sights and Sounds of Christmas light up the San Marcos River Walk in early December.

ATHLETIC ACADEMIC CENTER (AAC)

Located in the heart of campus, the AAC is an integral part of the life of Bobcat student-athletes and has a vast amount of services and assistance available. The AAC is structured after the principles of the NCAA CHAMPS (Challenging Athlete Minds for Personal Success) / Life Skills Program which is created to provide student-athletes with five basic components; Academics Excellence, Athletic Excellence, Community Service, Career Development and Personal Development.

The AAC, which is open around seventy hours each week Sunday-Friday, has an in-house computer lab with twenty-five desktop computers, as well as seven laptop computers, a scanner, color printer and a laserjet printer. The AAC has small and large cubicles for use during tutoring or individual study sessions. The AAC is lead by the Assistant Athletic Director for Academic Support and Student Services with the help of two full-time assistants, numerous tutors and front desk staff which consists of Texas State students. The AAC staff, in conjunction with the Compliance Coordinator, strive to educate the student-athletes about the numerous NCAA rules and regulations while monitoring the student-athletes progress for continuing eligibility. Each student-athlete works with the College (major) Advisor to make sure that they are enrolled in the correct classes to graduate. The AAC staff verifies the classes to ensure that they student-athlete is working toward their degree, making semester progress requirements and GPA requirements.



THE ACADEMIC NOTEBOOK

The AAC is involved with every aspect of a student-athlete's academic life while at Texas State. This relationship begin during the recruiting process, followed by new student orientation, PAWS Preview and continuing on with the Academic Notebook Program. The Academic Notebook Program is designed as a mentor program to assist freshman, transfer and at-risk student-athletes. Each student on the Notebook Program is assigned a mentor in



the AAC who they meet with on a regular basis throughout the semester. The Notebook Program requires that each student-athlete complete six hours of study time each week in the AAC. This program was developed in 1996 and Texas State University-San Marcos is the owner of the copyright for the program.

AAC TUTORING CENTER

Tutoring is offered in several different ways through the AAC and other campus resources. The AAC offers drop-in tutoring for a set group of classes on each night for those students who do not want the structure of assigned times each week. However, students who would like to meet with the same tutor each week have the option to do so by signing up with the Tutor Coordinator. Student-athletes are also strongly encouraged to seek assistance in the Student Learning Assistance Center in the Alkek Library and in the Office of Disability Services in the LBJ Student Center.

COUNCIL OF STUDENT-ATHLETES

All Texas State are represented by a smaller group of their peers through the Council of Student-Athletes. These student-athletes are considered to be the leaders on their respective teams. This group meets monthly to help plan community service events and special programs as well as serve as a voice of the student-athlete to the Department of Athletics Administration. This group consists of two representatives from each sport. The Presidency is split between Krystal Kolkhorst (volleyball) and Leslie Sharp (Softball) this way they both serve as president during their non-competitive season.



NCAA LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

The NCAA Leadership Conference promotes better communication among student-athletes, coaches, administrators, faculty and communities. The five-day Leadership Conference consists of daily exercises and activities to help the student-athletes develop as individuals and as contributing members to a group. Sophomore place kicker Steven Dietz represented Texas State at the 2004 NCAA Leadership Conference held May 30-June 3 at Disney's Wide World of Sports Complex and Coronado Springs Resort in Lake Buena Vista, Fla. Steven was one of 324 student-athletes chosen to attend the NCAA Leadership Conference out of 1175 nominations.

BOBCATS IN THE COMMUNITY

All Bobcat student-athletes are encouraged to be active in the San Marcos community. The 'Read with the 'Cats' Program is a reading incentive program for local first graders. Student-athletes volunteer throughout the year to visit the different classrooms and read with the students. The students are provided incentives for the number of books they read. This program is sponsored by HEB. In addition to the HEB 'Read with the 'Cats' Program, every athletic team participates in various community service activities throughout each year. Many teams and individuals participated in the Bobcat Build community service program, a community clean-up effort, along with students and staff throughout campus. Other student-athletes headed up a can food drive that provided canned goods for those families in need in the community.

The 2004 Texas State Cream of the Crop

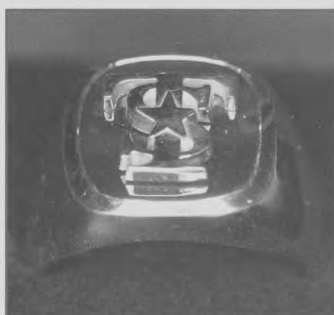

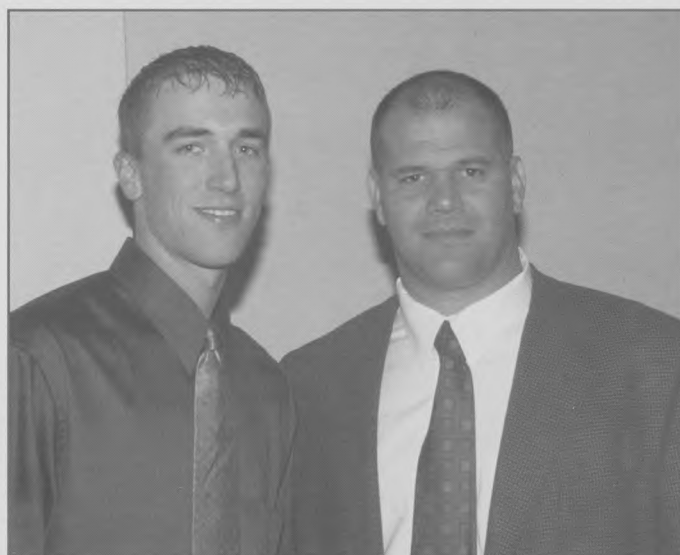

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Texas State University student-athletes are evaluated by the strength and conditioning staff to determine each player's strengths and weaknesses.

From the evaluations, the student-athletes are provided a computer generated, individualized strength and conditioning program. The program is designed to help the student-athletes become the most efficient and injury free as possible.

The weightlifting portion of the program is based on the olympic lifts (snatch, clean and jerk) which enhance the student-athlete's strength and speed development.

Each student-athlete's progress is monitored and changes are made in the computer as needed to provide the proper load at which to train for maximum results.

The strength and conditioning program is a year-round activity with in-season, off-season and summer workouts provided for each student-athlete. In-season, the younger football student-athlete's training load and intensity are increased to enhance their physical development and prepare them for the future.

Along with workouts, the student-athletes also receive education on nutrition and its importance to enhance athletic performance.

Texas State student-athletes continue to show significant increases in strength, power and speed in testing performed by the strength and conditioning staff.





ATHLETIC TRAINING ROOM

Texas State houses one of the most comprehensive Athletic Training Education programs in the region, featuring an accredited program. With a staff of eight certified athletic trainers, approximately 40 student athletic trainers, three orthopedic surgeons, a Primary Care physician, a Podiatrist serving as team physician, and Central Texas Medical Center providing diagnostic and surgical facilities, Texas State athletes are provided with a coeducational athletic health care environment.

The Athletic Training Education Program has produced over 215 graduates since 1972, who are now working as licensed and certified athletic trainers in high schools, colleges and sports medicine clinics across the country. Texas State also has eight alums working with various professional teams in football, baseball and hockey.

Providing quality health care for Texas State student-athletes is the primary goal of the sports medicine team.





HISTORY

The 2003 season marks the 100th year (89th season) of Bobcat football. In September of 1904, the Bobcats and St. Edward's played one another in the school's first football game. With a victory, college athletics at Texas State got underway just one year after the school officially opened its doors in 1903. Not every major event of Bobcat football history is chronicled below, but we have tried to highlight some of the major events of the past century.

Southwest Texas State Normal School - 1899-1925

1904 - Southwest Texas Normal, won the school's first football game in a 6-0 battle over St. Edward's of Austin, Texas.

1919 - Better known for his basketball influences at then Southwest Texas, O.W. Strahan became the head football coach and led the team to a 4-4 season record.

1920 - The Bobcats blasted Meridian 79-0 for what remains as the largest margin of victory in school history.

1921 - Two years after taking over, Strahan helped the 1921 football team to its first undefeated season at 7-0 and its first conference championship.

1923 - The long-standing rivalry with Stephen F. Austin begins with the first of 11 straight wins over the Lumberjacks, eight by shutouts.

1924 - One of the years the Bobcats, as we know them, were referred to as the Lobos.

Southwest Texas State Teachers College - 1925-1959

1926 - Another long-standing rival, Texas A&I, hits the Southwest Texas State schedule with the 'Cats posting a 13-2 victory in the first meeting between the two schools.

1931 - The Lone Star Conference is formed April 25, 1931, with Southwest Texas State, Sam Houston, East Texas State, Stephen F. Austin State and North Texas as the charter members.

1934 - Strahan's final season as the head coach of the Bobcats. He closed his tenure with a 70-53-9 record, the second most wins of any Bobcat head football coach. Joe Cheaney takes over in 1935 and continues until 1942.

1946 - George Vest named head football coach after the war and guides the 'Cats to a winning record in four of his five seasons.

1951 - Milton Jowers begins his football coaching career with Southwest Texas State and takes two different stints (1951-53 & 1961-64) to amass a 48-18-2 record.



Milton Jowers was perhaps the most influential coach in Texas State history, guiding the Bobcats in both football and basketball over a 20-year span.

1954 - R.W. Parker is named the fifth Bobcat head football coach and guides the 'Cats to a 5-0-1 Lone Star Conference Championship in his first season.

Southwest Texas State College - 1959-69

1960 - Jack Henry coaches Southwest Texas State for one year and finishes 2-8 before Milton Jowers returns for his second go-around with the 'Cats.

1963 - An undefeated season for Southwest Texas State at 10-0 as Milton Jowers embarks on perfection in his last full season as the head coach of the Bobcats.

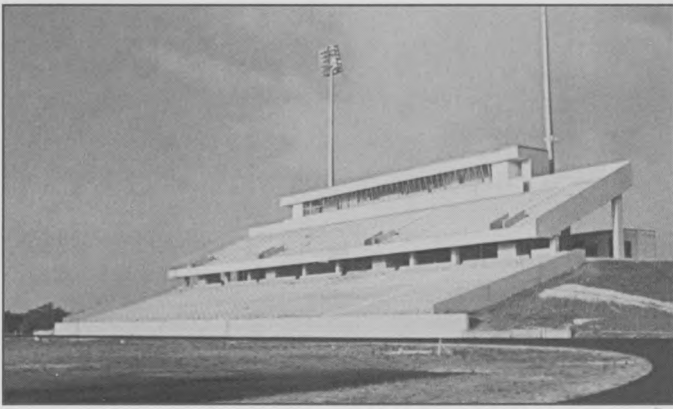
1964 - Bill Miller, an assistant coach at since 1961, takes over the reigns of the Bobcat football program after Jowers becomes ill. Miller has 11 winning seasons in 15 years as the Bobcats' main man and his 94 wins are the most-ever by a Southwest Texas State football coach.

Southwest Texas State University - 1969-2003



Bill Miller was a part of the Bobcat athletic program for 30 years, helping engineer the school's move to Division I status in 1984.

1979 - Jim Wacker is hired to replace Miller as football coach and takes an already solid program to an entirely different level.



Southwest Texas State got a new playing facility when Bobcat Stadium opened in 1981. The Bobcats won 17 of the first 18 games in the new stadium.

1981 - Wacker and the Bobcats go 13-1 and win the first of back-to-back NCAA Division II National Championships with wins over Jacksonville State (38-22), Northern Michigan (62-0) and North Dakota State (42-13). The only loss was a 21-14 decision to Texas A&I.



The excitement created by back-to-back National Championships is something those present will never forget.

1982 - Following up the previous national title, the 'Cats go undefeated, 14-0, in winning the second Division II Championship as Wacker parlays the success into a head coaching position at TCU. The road to the title had wins over Fort Valley State (27-6), Jacksonville State (19-14) and Cal-Davis (34-9).

1983 - John O'Hara arrives at Southwest Texas State as the head football coach in the final Division II season with the 'Cats. He guides the program to a 9-2 mark and first round playoff loss to Central Ohio (24-16). O'Hara left in 1989 and worked as an assistant coach for Hayden Fry at Iowa before dying in 1992.

1984 - Southwest Texas State makes the move to Division I-AA football status, leaving the Lone Star Conference and joining the Gulf Star Conference and posting a 7-4 overall record. Athletic Director Bill Miller is instrumental in the move up to Division I for all athletics.

1987 - Southwest Texas State moves into the Southland Conference in all sports, joining one of the strongest I-AA football leagues in the nation.

1990 - Dennis Franchione is named head football coach and posts back-to-back winning seasons before leaving for New Mexico. Season-ending losses to North Texas (16-15) and Sam Houston (26-25) crush the 'Cats' chances of a possible at-large playoff berth.

1992 - Jim Bob Helduser named the 11th head football coach in school history. A 23-20 loss to defending national champion Youngstown State in week three sets the tone for a disappointing 5-5-1 season for the Bobcats.

1994 - Donald Wilkerson breaks the school and Southland Conference single season rushing record with 1,569 yards.

1995 - Claude Mathis establishes a new Southland Conference record with 358 all-purpose yards in a single game. He also posts the school's second highest single season rushing mark with 1,286 yards.

1996 - Mathis breaks the school and Southland record for rushing yards in a season with 1,593.

1997 - Bob DeBesse coaches the Bobcats to a 24-14 win over Sacramento State. It is his first victory as the head coach, and came in front of 14,164 fans at Bobcat Stadium, the first sellout in 13 years.

1997 - Mathis shatters virtually every school and Southland Football League rushing record with 1,595 yards. He finishes with 4,691 career yards, the school and league record.

1998 - Southwest Texas State downs Nicholls State, 28-27, on Nov. 28 in the season finale. The game was rescheduled after massive flooding in central Texas on Oct. 17. The rivalry is now known as "The Battle for the Paddle" with Southwest Texas State winning the first installment in dramatic fashion.

1999 - In the final game of the Millennium, Southwest Texas State defeated Sam Houston 20-14. It was the program's only win over the Bearkats during the decade of the 1990's.

2000 - Southwest Texas State goes 7-4 to post its first winning season since 1991. The Bobcats are 5-2 in the Southland Football League, the best conference record since joining the league in 1987. Southwest Texas State was the "Texas State Champion" by virtue of its wins over both SFA and Sam Houston in the same year. In addition, defensive back C. J. Carroll is a unanimous All-America pick and the SFL Player of the Year following his senior season. He is also an Academic All-America choice.

2002 - Southland Football League reverts back to Southland Conference.

Texas State University - San Marcos - 2003--present

2004 - David Bailiff is announced as the school's 14th head football coach during a February 2004 news conference. He begins his tenure as Texas State's head football coach after playing for the 'Cats and working as an assistant on two different staffs.



Claude Mathis was the Southland Football League Player of the Year in 1996 and 1997.





TRADITIONS

NAME CHANGES

Texas State University-San Marcos is the official school name as determined when Governor Rick Perry signed the university's name-change bill on June 18, 2003. Texas State has undergone five name changes since its creation in 1899. They are listed below:

Southwest Texas State Normal School	1899-1925
Southwest Texas State Teachers College	1925-1959
Southwest Texas State College	1959-1969
Southwest Texas State University	1969-2003
Texas State University-San Marcos	2003-present

THE BOBCATS

Texas State's nickname, the Bobcats, was adopted in 1920, when members of the newly formed student newspaper, *The University Star*, began an editorial campaign to adopt an athletic mascot.

The school's student council joined *The Star's* efforts by setting up a committee to decide an official name. With Dr. C.S. Smith, the chair of the Biology Department, heading the committee the search was on. Dr. Smith's personal choice of Bobcats was accepted by both the name committee and the student body.

Dr. Smith supported his choice by pointing out that not only is the bobcat a resident of the Central Texas hill country, but it is a fighter of great courage, as well.

Former Coach Oscar Strahan was once quoted as saying, "A bobcat will fight you with everything he has; with four claws, teeth, speed and brains."

The new name proved to be an immediate boost for the 1921 football team, as the Bobcats went 7-0 on the year.

Southwest Texas State was the only college in the country, until the late twenties, to possess the name Bobcats for its athletic teams.

For years, the student body attempted to keep an official live mascot on campus. However, after several different bobcats, the idea was dropped.

TEXAS STATE COLORS

Texas State's school colors are maroon and gold, and are inspired by the native wildflower *Gaillardia*, which flourish in the area. The 1928 Pedagog describes the college flower as, "the loveliest that grows in this section of the country. It has delicate petals of a rich maroon which shades into gold near the center and is quite beautiful."

THE HILL

The steep hill upon which Old Main sits is known as Chautauqua, named for the late 19th century national social movement. A large tabernacle-like structure seating 1,500 occupied the pinnacle where Old Main now stands. Chautauqua provided popular education combined with entertainment in the form of lectures, concerts and plays.

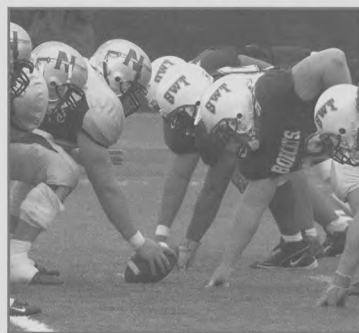
Before World War I, an unpaved road led to Old Main from the present-day Quad. The area in front of the building was a turnaround for buggies and Model T Fords. This road became treacherously slick on rainy days. A rite of passage for college boys in the early days of automobiles was to test their driving skills and their cars' ability to crest the muddy hill.

OLD MAIN

The red-roofed, castle-like landmark is Texas State's first building. Until 1910 it was the main and only campus structure. Its style is known as Victorian Gothic and was designed by architect E. Northcraft. Construction began in 1902 when Texas Governor Joseph Sayers laid the cornerstone. It proved complicated and expensive because it sat directly over a subterranean cavern that absorbed load after load of concrete. The foundation finally secured and the building opened in time for classes in the 1903 fall semester. As other buildings were added to the campus, Old Main served as the administration building for decades.

Currently, Old Main houses the School of Fine Arts and Communications, mass communications and student media.

THE BATTLE FOR THE PADDLE



There are many rivalries in college athletics today prompted by various events in history. The Texas State - Nicholls State game is one such rivalry and is identified as "The Battle for the Paddle."

A rowing oar has been painted with both school's colors and the final score of every game played between the two schools since 1998 is on the paddle. The winning team gets to hold on to the paddle until the next meeting.

Texas State won the first three meetings, while Nicholls has won the last three. The game is played in recognition of the 1998 floods in central Texas, which forced the game to be postponed from its October date to November.

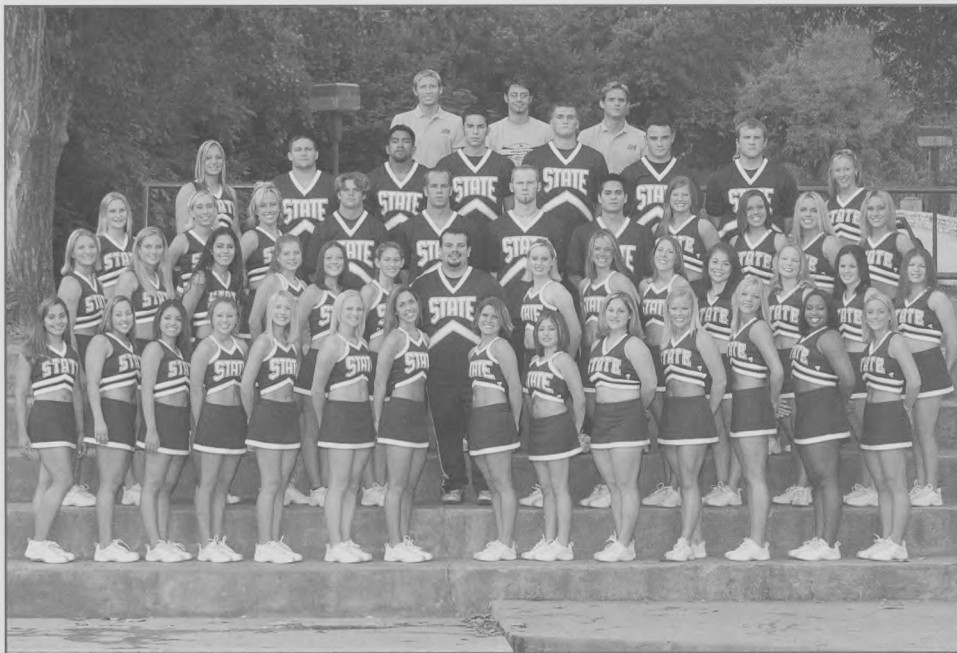
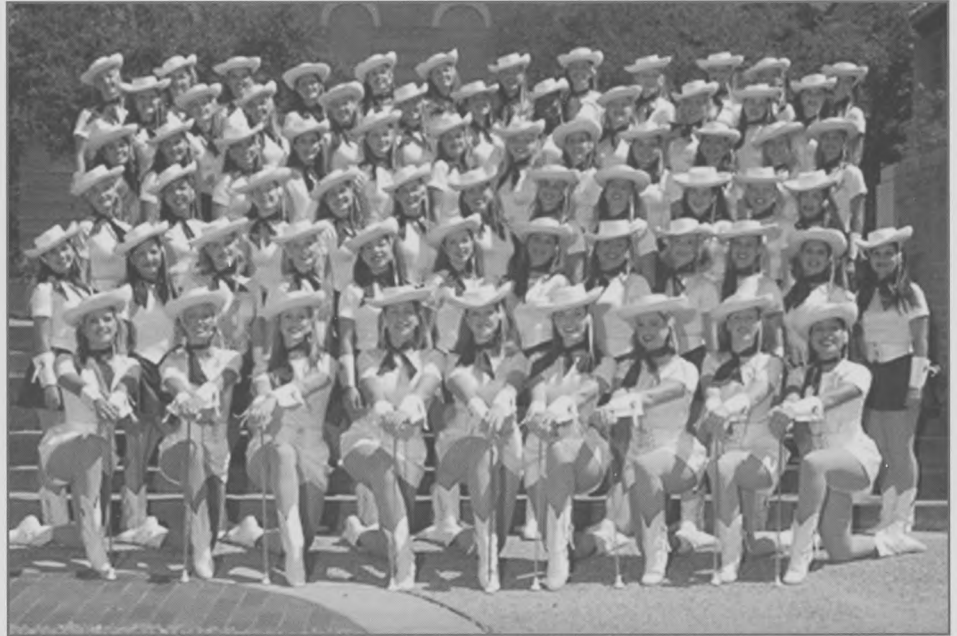


TEXAS STATE SPIRIT

The Strutters have appeared on every major television network, performing at pro football and basketball games, car races, and parades throughout America, including the 2000 Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade™. Strutters have also represented Texas State, Texas and America in over 17 countries, and were the first U.S. dance team to perform in China.



THE TEXAS STATE CHEERLEADERS

The Texas State Cheerleaders will provide all the yells and energy during the 2004-2005 athletic seasons. Under the direction of Jeff Nixon and Joseph Barton, the Cheerleaders are involved with numerous other campus and community outreaches, including Alumni Affairs, Parent's Association and the New Student Organization.

The Texas State Cheerleaders are looked upon as ambassadors of the school and are to conduct themselves appropriately both on the field and in the classroom.



FIRST CLASS TRAVEL

The Bobcats will once again travel first class as they will take a charter flight to their October game at Appalachian State. The 'Cats will travel on a Frontier Airlines charter.



BOBCATS TAKE ON TOP-NOTCH OPPONENTS

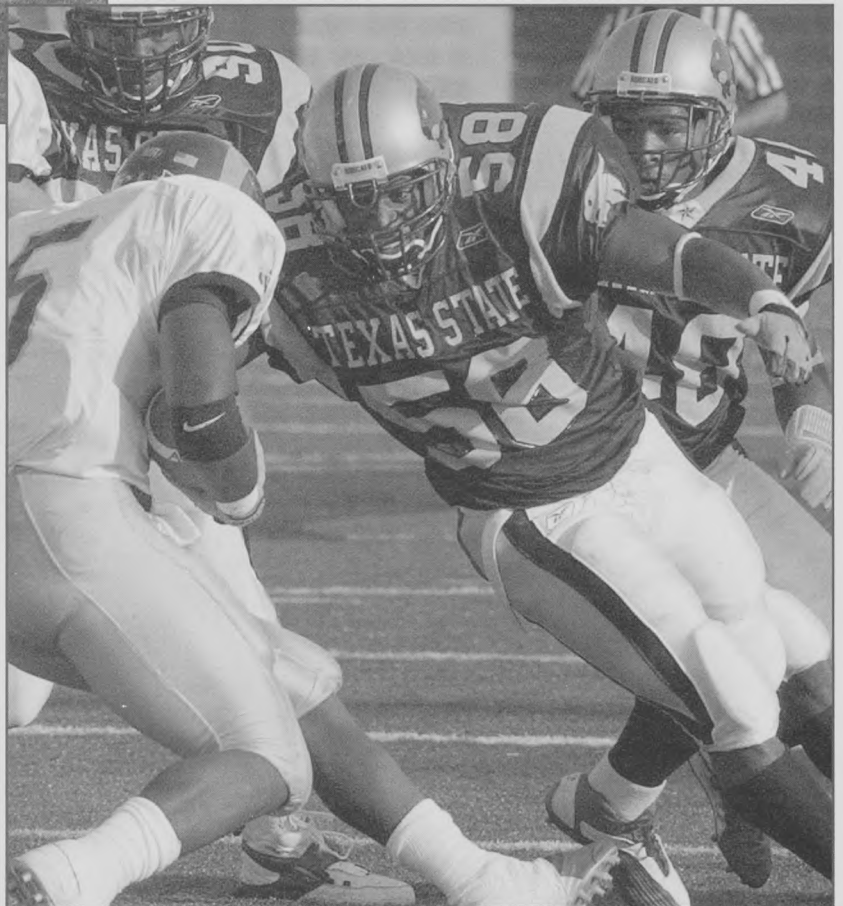
For the seventh season in a row, Texas will take on an opponent from a major conference and continue a pattern of playing one of the toughest schedules around.

Next season, the Bobcats have the likes of Texas A&M and Kentucky on the slate.

'Cats Get Back to Work

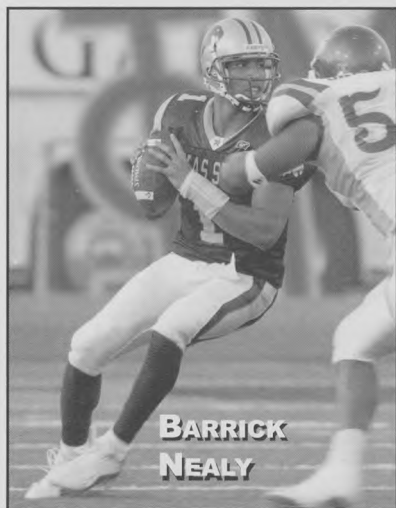
Utilizing the same energy, enthusiasm and leadership skills he displayed as a player and assistant coach, David Bailiff is in the midst of redirecting the Texas State football program.

Bailiff and his new staff inherit a team that finished 4-8 a year ago with eight offensive and eight defensive starters back. In addition, the Bobcats return both kickers.

While the hope is for a speedy turnaround, Bailiff wants the turnaround fueled by hard work and not from a quick fix.

"We want to be an aggressive football team and a smart football team this fall," Bailiff said. "That takes hard work and dedication by every person in the program."

Texas State returns its quarterback, the leading rusher from last fall, two key receivers and four offensive linemen.



Junior signal-caller **Barrick Nealy** was the starter a year ago and shattered nearly every passing record the school had. After one year, he owns single season marks in passing yards, completions, attempts, and touchdowns.

Junior receiver **K.R. Carpenter** had a solid season as he caught more passes than any other player in school history (60).

Senior **Terrell Harris** returns after leading the team with 780 rushing yards and seven touchdowns in 2003.

The offensive line returns senior **Ken McKoy** to anchor a line that made positive strides throughout the spring. Juniors

Thomas Keresztury and **Luke Horder** were starters last fall, as well.

The defensive side of the ball boasts strength up the middle from the interior line to the inside linebackers and safeties.

Junior **Travis Upshaw** and newcomer **Fred Evans** provide the strength on the front line, while junior **David Simmons**, last year's leading tackler, and sophomore **Jeremy Castillo** (third in tackles in 2003) will handle linebacking chores.

In the secondary, sophomores **Walter Musgrove**, the second leading tackler, and **Epsilon Williams** (fourth in tackles in 2003), both return at safety. Senior **Glenn Settles** returns after sitting out all of 2003.

On the corners, senior **William Heyward** has emerged as a starter along with newcomer **Derwin Straughter**.

The Bobcats also return both kickers, including Southland First-Team punter **Cory Elolf** and place-kicker **Steven Dietz**.

The 2004 Bobcats will take on an aggressive schedule with six road games, including a battle with the Big XII's Baylor Bears, and five home games in Bobcat Stadium.

"It is a challenging schedule, including Big XII opponent Baylor and trips to both coasts in a three-week period," Bailiff said.

After the season and home opener against former Lone Star rival Angelo State on Sept. 4, Texas State will make the drive up I-35 to face Baylor in Waco on Sept. 11. It will be the home opener for Baylor, who finished 3-9 a year ago.

The Bobcats return home for Family Day on Sept. 18 to face Southeastern La. in the final season before the Lions become a member of the SLC.

After an open week, the Bobcats face a tough three-game stretch just prior to the start of Southland play. The stretch opens with a trip on Oct. 2 to face Southern Conference power Appalachian State, a 7-4 team from 2003 that finished second in the conference. The Bobcats follow with a home game on Oct. 9 against Florida Atlantic, a playoff team from 2003 that finished 11-3. The third and final game of the trio is the final non-conference game of 2004. It will send the Bobcats west on Oct. 16 to tangle with Cal Poly (7-4) of the

newly formed Great West Football Conference.

"While the non-conference schedule is challenging, there is little doubt the Southland Conference remains the toughest I-AA conference around," Bailiff added. "We will have our hands full each week of the five-week league schedule."

The Southland Conference schedule features two home games and three on the road. Texas State opens with Stephen F. Austin at home on Oct. 23 for Homecoming 2004. The final game of October has the Bobcats on the road at McNeese State (Oct. 30) for a showdown with the Cowboys, last year's Southland champion with a 10-2 record. The Bobcats follow the trip to Lake Charles with another road trip to Louisiana, this time to Natchitoches to face the Demons of Northwestern State, a 6-6 team from 2003.

Returning for the home finale, senior day, and T-Association weekend, the Bobcats host Nicholls State in the annual "Battle for the Paddle."

The final game of 2004 takes the Bobcats to Huntsville to take on the Bearkats of Sam Houston State. Texas State downed the Bearkats, another old rival, in the season finale last fall, 49-28.

THE OFFENSE

QUARTERBACK

Junior **Barrick Nealy** (6-5, 210), the starter from a year ago, returns for his second season with plenty of accolades to his credit. Nealy established numerous school records for both a single game and for a single season in completions, attempts, yards and touchdowns. He will, however, have competition this fall.

Redshirt freshman **Chase Wasson** (5-11, 180), the Class 5A State Player of the Year two years ago, will go toe-to-toe with Nealy during fall camp. He was impressive during spring drills.

"We have two quality quarterbacks for this fall," Bailiff said. "They both have all the intangibles. They are athletic and can make plays and they are both strong leaders."



RUNNING BACK

Senior **Terrell Harris** (5-11, 230) is back for his final season as a Bobcat and is coming off his best year at Texas State.



Harris ran for 780 yards for 5.6 yards a carry and tied for the team lead with six rushing touchdowns. Harris is a Second-Team pre-season pick in the Southland.

Junior **Morris Brothers** (5-9, 175) provided a spark for the 'Cats in 2003, rushing for 500 yards and six scores in just nine games.

Senior **Trevor McKenzie** (5-8, 168) and junior transfer **Douglas Sherman** (5-7, 200) are also expected to vie for playing time on the 2004 squad.

"We are extremely deep at running back with a blend of speed and quickness and size and strength," Bailiff said. "The group is talented and diverse."

WIDE RECEIVER

The receiver position is led by school record holder **K.R. Carpenter** (5-11, 185),



who pulled in the most passes in the history of the program with 60 receptions for 780 yards and seven scores in 2003.

Carpenter isn't alone, though, as senior **John Tyson** (6-0, 173) is back after a 23-reception season that included four touchdowns.

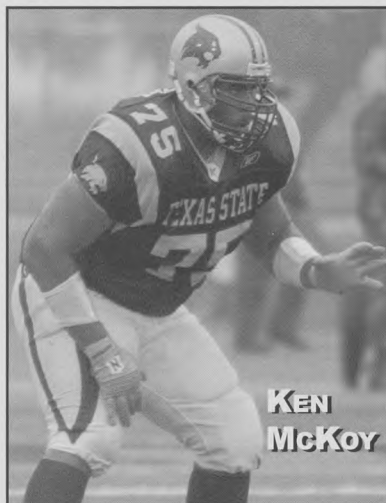
Seniors **Devin Freeman** (5-8, 150) and **Ike Chekwa** (6-2, 200) are also back for their final season. Freeman had 15 catches and Chekwa eight grabs a year ago.

Several newcomers are expected to play a major role in the Bobcat offense of 2004, including junior transfer **Markee White** (6-7, 205) and redshirt freshman **Tyrone Scott** (6-0, 170).

"The receiver position has to start with the school record holder, K.R. Carpenter," Bailiff said, "and Johnny Tyson is always going to be a threat. We have to develop more depth and we need all our receivers to become better blockers."

OFFENSIVE LINE

The offensive line is a position where developing depth will be critical in the early fall.



There are three starters back from a year ago, led by senior **Ken McKoy** (6-5, 365), a two-time All-Southland selection and a First-Team pick this pre-season. He is projected as the starter at left tackle.

Juniors **Thomas Keresztury** (6-6, 250) and **Luke Horder** (6-6, 305) are back for their second year of starting for the 'Cats. They are expected to handle the right side of the line with Keresztury, a pre-season All-SLC Second-Team selection, at guard and Horder at tackle.

The center position will be manned by sophomore **Ryne Miller** (6-4, 310), who

saw action last fall as a backup on the line.

The fifth starter is a newcomer to the line, but is a veteran to the program. Junior **Joel Moore** (6-1, 257) is projected to start at left guard after making the move from the defensive line in the spring.

"The offense line will be led by Ken McKoy, an All-Southland and All-America candidate," Bailiff said. "We have other standouts in (Thomas) Keresztury and (Luke) Horder, but we will have to get bigger and stronger as a unit."

TIGHT END

After a one year absence, the Bobcats have brought back the tight end position to the offense.

Senior **Justin Marcellus** (6-2, 230) was a starter two years ago for the 'Cats, while **Randall Moshier** (6-1, 220) was a backup on the 2002 squad. Moshier caught eight passes and Marcellus three balls two years ago.

Another tight end candidate is transfer **Matt Padron** (6-5, 265).

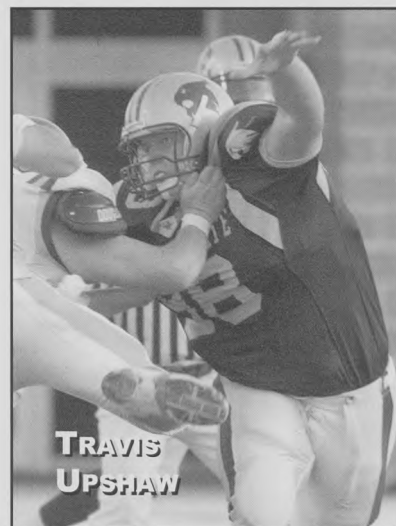
"Justin Marcellus was the leader at tight end in the spring and will get pushed this fall by transfer Matt Padron," Bailiff said. We do have some big bodies who can run down the field."

THE DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE

The Bobcats will return to a 4-2-5 defensive look and appear to have good strength up the middle.

The interior defensive line will be led by junior **Travis Upshaw** (6-1, 300), a





starter from a year ago, who will team with newcomer **Fred Evans** (6-5, 300) to give the 'Cats strength in the middle of the front line. Junior **Teddy Jones** (6-2, 262) is a solid backup in the middle.

On the outside, junior **Derrick Glasper** (6-1, 265) had a solid first season at Texas State, finishing seventh in tackles. **Dan Dolce** (6-0, 270), a backup most of 2003, is penciled in as the starter at the other end position.

Sophomore **Kyle Simpson** (6-1, 240) and freshman **Nick Clark** (6-0, 230) are projected as backups at end.

"(Travis) Upshaw and (Fred) Evans are both 300 pounds and had good springs playing on the interior," Bailiff said. "We have to get better on stopping the run from the end position as we remain undersized."

LINEBACKER

One of the biggest stories of 2003 was the rise of former walk-on **David Simmons** (5-11, 220) into a starting role and then leading the team in tackles. Simmons had 112 tackles and is a pre-season All-Southland pick this fall.



Sophomore **Jeremy Castillo** (5-11, 198) earned a starting role last fall as a true freshman and made the most of it with 77 tackles. This fall he is back to team with Simmons again.

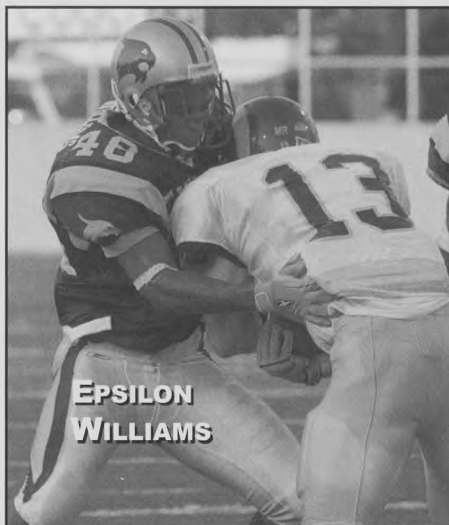
Second-year Bobcats **Jacob Webb** (6-2, 215) and **Nick Session** (5-9, 210) are the projected backups at linebacker.

"The linebacker position is led by David Simmons, who led the team last fall, and Jeremy Castillo, who had an outstanding freshman season," Bailiff said. "Like many other positions, we must develop depth at our linebacking positions."

SECONDARY

In the 4-2-5 system, there is always a nickel package on the field, asking safeties to stop the run as well as covering passes.

The Bobcat safeties are led by sophomore **Epsilon Williams** (5-10, 195), who posted 69 tackles in his first season last fall. Williams will start at free safety, while



senior **Glenn Settles** (5-9, 190) is coming back from an injury and is expected to start at the KAT position. Junior **Larry Hayden** (6-0, 198), who had 39 tackles a year ago, is projected as the strong safety starter.

Backups at safety include sophomore **Walter Musgrove** (5-9, 190), **Olushola Obafemi** (6-1, 190) and **Dallas Coleman** (6-0, 200).

Cornerback is a position with two new starters heading into fall camp. Senior **William Heyward** (5-9, 190) earned himself a starting position at corner in the spring and newcomer **Derwin Straughter** (5-8, 175) is the other starter.

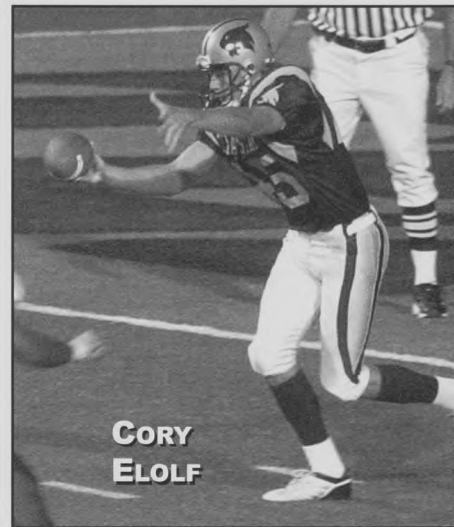
Veterans **Kenyon Leno** (5-8, 185), who had 40 tackles in 2003, and **Nato James** (5-10, 190) are the backups.

"Because we use five defensive backs, we have a need for plenty of quality athletes," Bailiff said. "Epsilon Williams is the leader of the group and it will be a big plus for us to get Glenn Settles back."

"Coming out of the spring, Derwin Straughter and William Heyward came out as the starters at cornerback. With our system, our corners have to become more physical players."

THE KICKING GAME

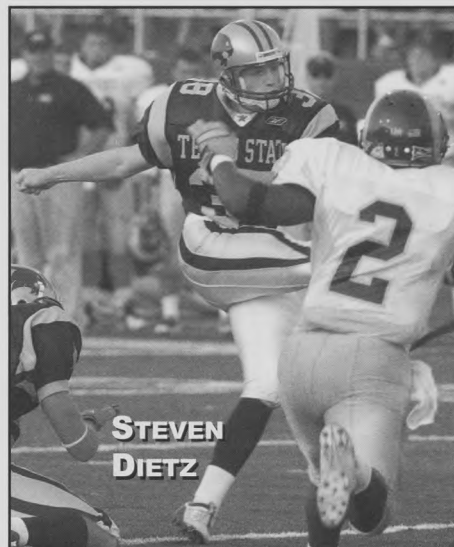
The Bobcats return both specialists in the kicking game with junior punter **Cory Elolf** (6-1, 175), the returning All-



Southland First-Team punter, leading the way.

Elolf averaged a league-best 43.4 yards a punt last fall with a school-record 86-yard punt to his credit.

The place-kicking duties will again be handled by **Steven Dietz** (5-10, 170), a sophomore back for his second season. Dietz converted all 32 extra point tries in 2003 and made seven of 15 field goals.



"Both of our kickers are All-Southland caliber kickers and had great springs for us," Bailiff said. "They have strong legs and both have the potential to change the course of a game."

Zwinggi earned unanimous First-Team All-District, Greater San Antonio All-Area, and Super All-West Texas honors as well as being selected to play in the US Army All-American Bowl. He rushed for more than 2,000 yards and scored 24 touchdowns last fall. He has been timed with a 4.29 in the 40. Zwinggi was born Oct. 6, 1985, and his parents are Stan and Cindy Zwinggi. He was also recruited by Kansas, Baylor, Stephen F. Austin, and Sam Houston State.

DAVID BAILIFF

(Texas State '81)

Former player and assistant coach David Bailiff is returning home to handle head coaching duties of the football program at his alma mater, Texas State University.

"Our concern for doing things right was why we hired David --- his record, his integrity, and his general interest in his students' welfare," Texas State President Denise Trauth said at the hiring of Bailiff. "This hiring shows that our players are students first and athletes second, and that we want them to be winners not only on but off the field."

Bailiff is a former Bobcat team captain and former defensive coordinator and assistant head coach. His return to take over the program he so dearly loves was more of a business decision than anything.

"I came back because everything is in place for this program to move forward and take the steps necessary to be successful," Bailiff said. "When I came to interview, I did not know what my interest level was, but when I left the interview, I knew I wanted this job."

"In this first year our job is simple --- we have to create an atmosphere for these young men to work hard and work smart. We want to be the hardest working, smartest football team in the Southland Conference."

One of the top recruiters in the state of Texas, David Bailiff had just finished his third season at TCU. He served as the team's defensive coordinator for both the 2002 and 2003 seasons, as well as working with the defensive line. The 2003 Frogs, who finished the season with an 11-2 record, were ranked 25th in the final AP Poll, and 24th in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll.

The Frogs built quite a tradition of defense in Fort Worth. Over the past three years, the Frogs ranked 24th, first and 38th in the country in total defense and tenth, first, and ninth in rushing defense.

In 2002, TCU allowed just 240.2 yards of total offense per game, tops in the country. They surrendered an average of just 64.8 yards on the ground, the best mark in Division I college football. Included was a school record minus-53 yards rushing by Tulane. They also ranked second in the country in pass efficiency defense, allowing their opponents to complete less than 39 percent of their pass attempts. Six Horned Frog defenders earned all-conference accolades, including 2002 C-USA Defensive Player of the Year and Second-Team All-American LaMarcus McDonald.

"I've never been more excited in my life," Bailiff said at his news conference. "There has never been a better time



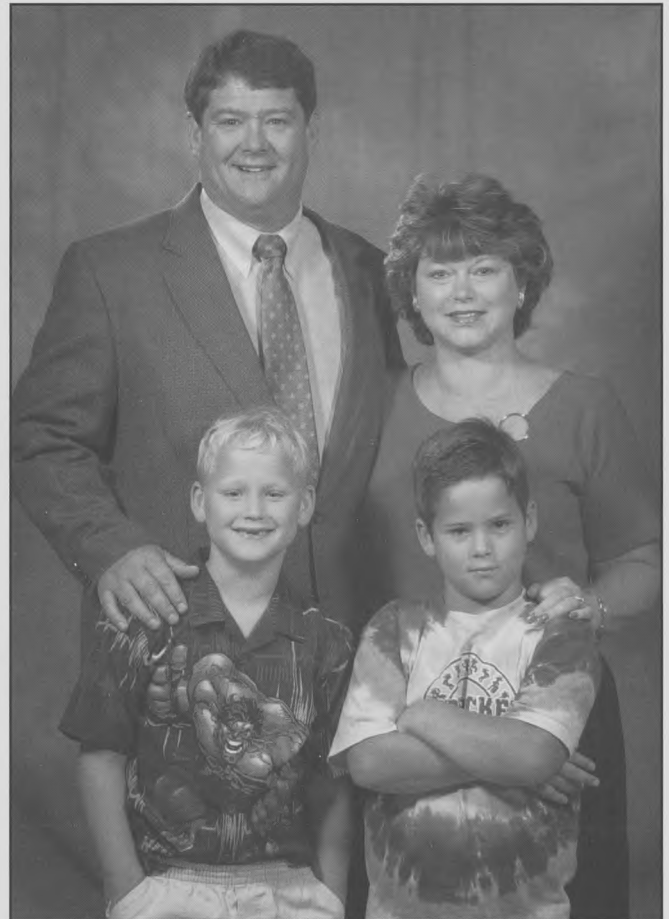
for this hiring then now. We're gonna be there for these young men around the clock. We're going to give them love, and along with that comes tough love. I'm going to work every day like I'm going to spend the rest of my life here.

"This is not a David Bailiff program, it's all of ours. It's going to take all of us to get the momentum going in the right direction again. I promise this to Texas High School football coaches: the only reason I will go to Chicago is to buy a pizza. You do not have to leave the great state of Texas to find good student-athletes. We're going to win and graduate Texans."

A former standout tight end at Texas State (formerly Southwest Texas), Bailiff joined the Horned Frogs in 2001 after serving as assistant head coach/defensive coordinator at his alma mater. In addition, he coached the defensive line at Texas State.

Bailiff began his coaching career as the defensive line coach at New Braunfels (Texas) High from 1982-84. He went into private business from 1984-88 before returning to the coaching ranks.

Bailiff served as a defensive graduate assistant in 1988 at Texas State before becoming the Bobcats' full-time defensive line coach in 1989. He worked under the late

John O'Hara for one year and with Dennis Franchione for two years during his first coaching stint in San Marcos.

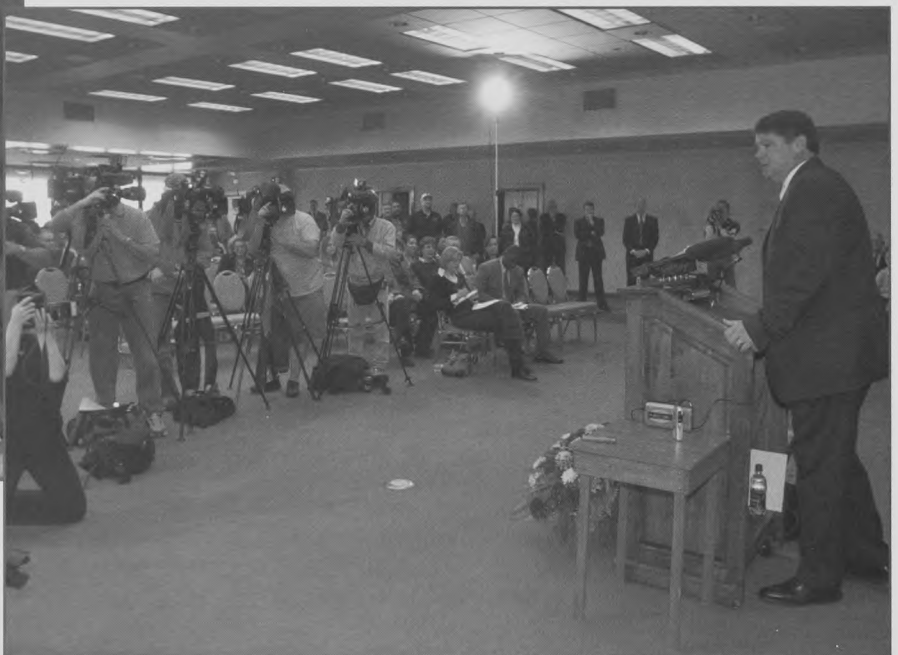
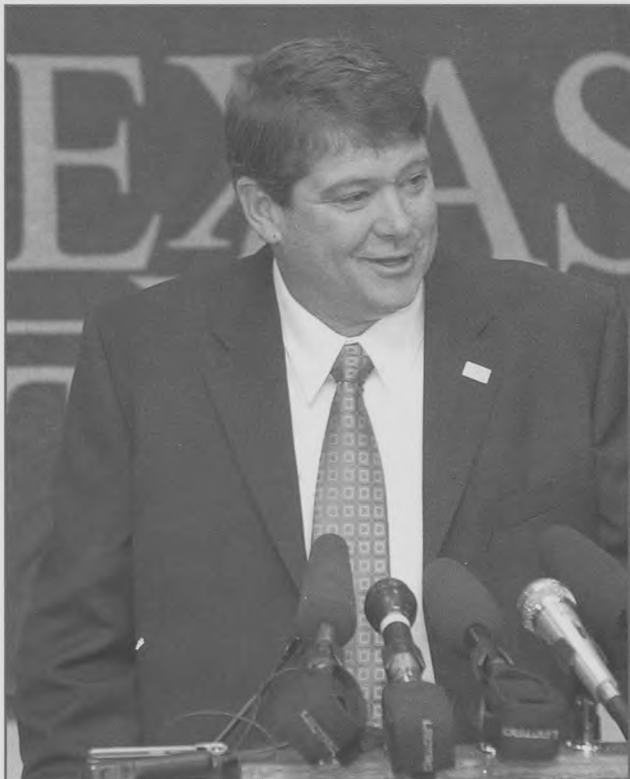
Bailiff left Texas State in 1992 for an assistant coaching position at New Mexico, where he handled the defensive line and recruiting. He returned to Texas State in 1997 to take over as the defensive coordinator under Bob DeBesse. He added assistant head coaching duties to his role in 1999.

In 1999, Bailiff was selected by the AFCA as the NCAA I-AA Assistant Coach of the Year.

Bailiff was named All-Lone Star Conference as well as All-America honorable mention while playing at Texas State from 1977-80. He served as team captain in 1980 and was named honorable mention to the Lone Star Team of the Decade.

Bailiff is married to the former Angie Daniels of Versailles, Missouri. He has a daughter, Brooke (20) and the couple has twin seven-year-old sons, Gregory and Grayson.

David Bailiff was introduced to the media and to the San Marcos and campus communities in February as he was hired as the 14th head football coach in school history. Basic Coaching Philosophy

"When you are working with young men who are student-athletes, you have to work in a world of trust. If we are to trust them on third and one, we have to be able to trust them to do the right things on Friday nights. We have to be able to trust them to work hard and enjoy doing it with a smile on their face. What we have to accomplish in our first year is create an atmosphere of accountability. The student-athletes must be accountable to themselves, their teammates, their coaches and the university."

Offensive Philosophy

"You will see us stretch the field vertically because we still have some great receivers. We also have to be able to run the ball to manage the clock. We will bring in some option calls because that allows us to limit defensive blitz packages. Our goal would be able to balance the offensive side of the ball to use our talented receivers and talented tailbacks."

Defensive Philosophy

"We will be extremely multiple. We will try and create confusion by giving the quarterback different looks. We will have a blitz mentality. With risk comes rewards when everyone works together. We will take risks at times defensively to try and create negative plays and turnovers."

Coaching Staff Chemistry

"I am excited about this staff. There is no one on this staff that I did not know before my arrival. They are here



because they are good people and because they understand the role of student-athletes. They understand they adopted a large group of young men when they were hired and we will treat them as sons."

Thoughts on First Game as a Head Coach Sept. 4

"The biggest difference is while you've been used to getting the defense ready for the opener as the defensive coordinator, now you

are responsible for getting all the coaches, and the trainers, and the equipment ready. This is a more extensive process of getting ready. I've had some great teachers in the past and I am modeling this program after some of them"

Why Did You Return to Texas State?

"Timing is everything. I love this university but that is not why I came back. I came back because there is a new facility in the endzone, because there is a new athletic director and most importantly I came back because there is a new president. When we visited, Dr. Trauth shared her vision and what she wanted with the program and what her commitment level was going to be to the program. So, while I love this place, my return was a business decision."



Why Do Kids Choose Texas State?

"There is a great college environment at Texas State. The academic status of this school is outstanding. There are tremendous academic programs and we are creating new programs all the time. Our athletic facilities are in order, as well. And socially, this is a great community with a small town atmosphere where you feel safe. Everything you need to be successful in college is here. We are in a great location, near to so many of the major cities in the state. We are far enough from home, yet close enough to get a home-cooked meal from mom."

Expectations

"What I want this year is for us to be the hardest-working and smartest team in the Southland Conference. We have to get the attitude in line and this coaching staff has done a great job of developing accountability and trust. We need these young men to take ownership of their football program."

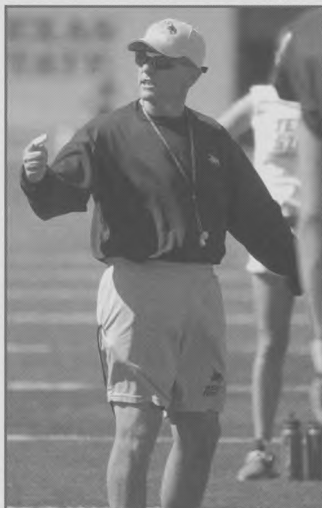
Wright comes to the Bobcats after spending the past four seasons as the athletic director and head football coach at New Braunfels Canyon High. Wright helped turn around the Cougar program. Inheriting a program without recent success, Wright endured two years with only one win before the corner was turned and Canyon went 7-2 in 2002 and advanced to the state quarterfinals in 2003.

Wright, a 1981 graduate of Texas State was also the head coach at East Bernard, where the team was an area finalist in 1999, and Karnes City, where the team posted back-to-back third place district finishes. Wright was also an assistant coach at El Campo for five years, helping the program to three district titles, and coached at both Klein Oak and Pearland.

Wright worked at Southwestern La. University for two seasons prior to his high school stops.

Frank Hernandez is in his second season as a Bobcat assistant coach. This fall, he will serve as the co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Hernandez was the receivers coach last fall, working with K.R. Carpenter, who broke the single season reception record.

Hernandez came to Texas State from the University of Houston, where he coached cornerbacks for two years in the Cougar defense.

Hernandez also spent one year at Wyoming, coaching the running backs and coordinating recruiting for the Cowboys.

Prior to his stop in Laramie, Hernandez was an assistant at South Florida for four seasons, working with receivers and handling recruiting. Over the first 33 weeks of the programs existence, USF maintained a top 25 ranking 24 consecutive weeks, finishing both the 1998 and 1999 seasons in the national poll.

Hernandez also had coaching stops at Mission (Texas) High and Pharr, San Juan, Alamo North High.

Hernandez was a four-year starter at Kansas State, playing for Bill Snyder. He was a three-time All-Big Eight Conference selection. He ended his career as number three on the all-time reception list (120) and number four in receiving yards (1,489).

A native of Mission, Texas, Hernandez posted impressive receiving numbers at Mission High that remain among the state's best. BLAKE MILLER

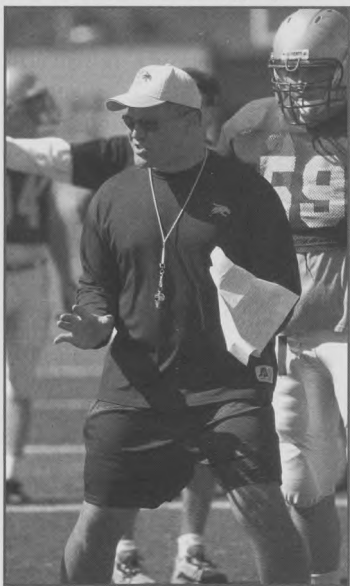
Co-Offensive Coordinator/

Blake Miller returns to the Bobcats and will be in his fourth year here after spending the 2003 season at SMU. Miller will again fill the role of offensive line coach as well as serving as the co-offensive coordinator.

At SMU, Miller was the offensive line coach for the Mustangs for one year.

Miller originally came to Texas State after three successful seasons at rival Southland Conference program Northwestern State. Miller helped the Demons to a pair of Southland championships as the offensive was ranked at or near the top of nearly every offensive category in the league. He has coached six linemen at Texas State who have earned All-Southland accolades. In six years in the league, Miller has coached 12 different players to All-SLC honors, including two All-Americans.



The 2000 Texas State team posted a 7-4 overall record and a 5-2 mark in the Southland, the best since the school joined the league.

Miller, a member of the American Football Coaches Association, also coached at Kilgore (Texas) High for two seasons and Episcopal (La.) High for one.

For three seasons, Miller played in the National Football League with New England, Detroit and the New York Giants. In 1992, Miller played in 12 games with the Lions, starting five at center.

Miller was a four-year letter winner and a two-year starter at Louisiana State University. He earned his degree in 1993. He was a First-Team All-Southeastern Conference selection as a senior and received All-America notice, as well. Craig Naivar, a native of Taylor, Texas, was named as Texas State's defensive coordinator and safeties coach just two years after he earned the same title at rival Sam Houston. Naivar comes to the Bobcats after spending the past four years with the Bearkats.

In addition to two years as defensive coordinator at SHSU, Naivar was defensive line coach and special teams coordinator.

At SHSU, Naivar coached nine All-Southland selections. In 2002, the Bearkats ranked third in the Southland in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. In 2001 the Bearkats led the league in quarterback sacks, ranked second in turnover ratio, and third in total defense. The Bearkats won the SLC crown and reached the I-AA Quarterfinals, losing to the eventual National Champion Montana Grizzlies. The Bearkats finished the season ranked #7 in the nation. In 2000, the Bearkats led the league in kickoff returns, were second in punt returns, and third in sacks. The Bearkats blocked seven punts and returned five for touchdowns. In addition, Naivar's special teams set a school record for most blocked kicks (12) in one season.



Naivar also served two seasons as special teams coordinator and defensive line coach at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, Ill., where he coordinated all phases of special teams play and recruited Texas and Kansas junior colleges and Dallas/Fort Worth, Memphis, and Louisville high schools.

During spring 1998, Naivar was a defensive graduate assistant coach at TCU under former Bobcat and current Texas A&M University head coach Dennis Franchione. Naivar also worked under Franchione at the University of New Mexico in 1996 and 1997, coaching the defensive line, tight ends and wide receivers.

From 1994 to 1995, he was special teams coordinator and defensive assistant at Hardin-Simmons under Texas High School Coaches Association Hall of Honor Member Jimmie Keeling.

He was a four-year football letter-winner at quarterback and free safety, earning All-Conference honors and playing on a conference championship and national semifinal team as a senior. He also received academic honors.

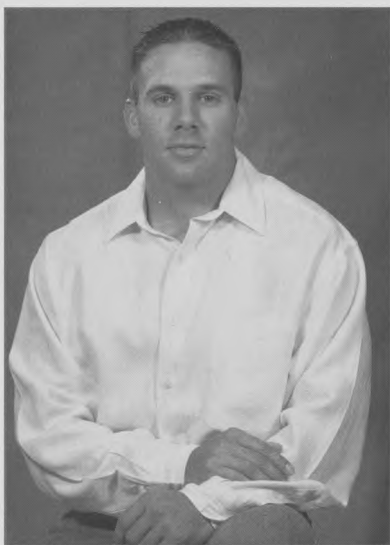
Travis Bush is in his first season back at his alma mater, coaching the Bobcat wide receivers.

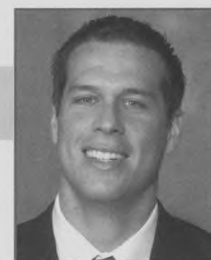

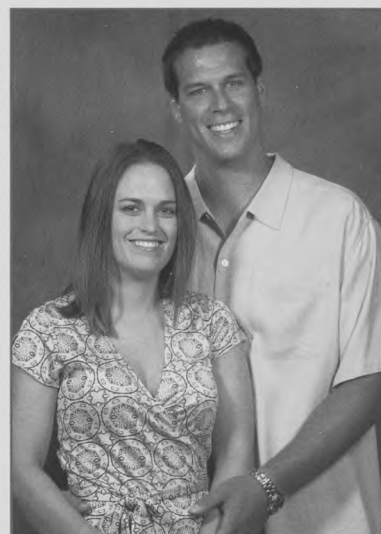
Darin Eliot is in his second season as an assistant football coach at Texas State. Eliot will work with the linebackers this fall after spending last season with the defensive backs.

The 2002 Hurricanes won the Big East and played for the National Championship, finishing the season with a 12-1 record. Miami's secondary finished the season ranked number one in the country and set a NCAA record for fewest yards allowed per pass completion, despite being ranked in the preseason as the Hurricanes' top weakness.

Eliot became a graduate assistant at the University of Houston in 2000 where he served for two years primarily as a defensive assistant focusing on safeties and special teams. However, Eliot's duties also involved direction of the Cougars' scout team and scouting of opponents.

Eliot began his coaching career in 1998 at the University of Wyoming. A former linebacker at Wyoming, Eliot worked as a student assistant with the linebackers in 1998 and was promoted to graduate assistant in 1999. Eliot's duties at Wyoming included coaching the secondary and special teams, assisting the defensive coordinator and serving as players' advisor.

Eliot played linebacker at Wyoming, where he earned a bachelor's of science degree in science & mathematics with a minor in zoology in 1999. Eliot earned master's of education in sports administration from the University of Houston in 2002. He is married to the former Mikel Marsh.

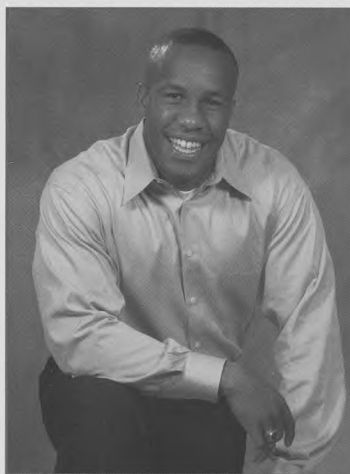
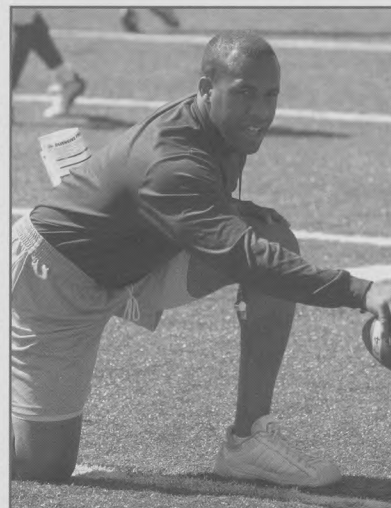
Washington will coach for his first time as the cornerbacks coach of the Texas State defense.

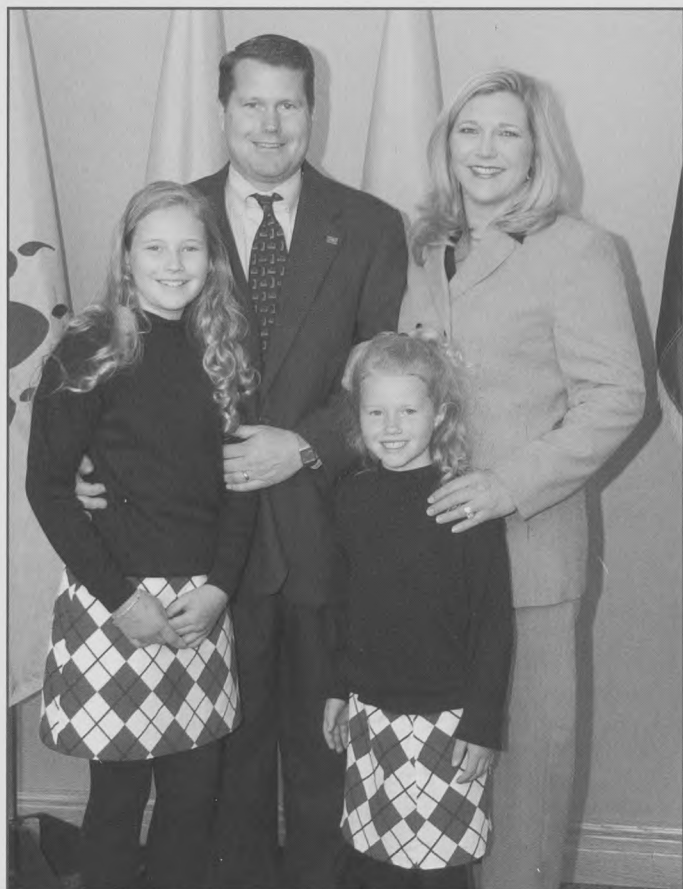
Larry Teis was named director of athletics at Texas State on March 11, 2004 by University President Denise M. Trauth.

Game one at New Mexico

Albuquerque, N.M. --- Scoring on each of its first six possessions, the University of New Mexico defeated Texas State, 72-8, on the opening night of the 2003 season.

The Lobos scored three times on the ground and three times in the air to lead 41-8 at the half.

Texas State quarterback Barrick Nealy was a warrior, battling all four quarters of play, converting 27 of 60 passes for 321 yards. He had two interceptions and one touchdown.

The Bobcats only score came with 12:51 left in the second period as Nealy connected with Johnny Tyson on a 70-yard pass play that came on a four and three from the 30. Nealy then hit Kenny Samuels on the two-point conversion.

Nealy tied the school record for completions with 27 (ties Ron Rittmann vs. NLU in 1988) and established a school record with the 60 attempts (49-old record by two players). He also set the record for total offensive plays with 70, breaking the mark of Ron Jacoby (57 vs., East Texas State in 1982).

Junior defensive back Kenyon Leno led Texas State with 12 tackles, while freshman Epsilon Williams added nine tackles.

Game two vs. Angelo State

SAN MARCOS, Texas --- It was a great night for the Bobcats of Texas State, bouncing back from the season-opening loss at New Mexico with a 42-7 victory over Angelo State Saturday night.

Quarterback Barrick Nealy set a school record passing effort with 398 yards on 29 of 44 passing for four touchdowns. He also had four interceptions. Nealy's 29 completions were also a school-best.

In addition, running back Terrell Harris had a solid night with 112 rushing yards on just 16 carries. The junior also scored the game's first points with a two-yard plunge less than five minutes into the game.

The Bobcats scored twice in the first period, the second on a Nealy to Kenneth Samuels pass, and then scored three touchdowns in the second period, all on passes from Nealy. Game three at Tulsa

TULSA, Okla. --- Texas State held with Division I-A Tulsa for the first half, but a 27-point third quarter pulled the host Golden Hurricane over the Bobcats 41-15 at Skelly Stadium. Excluding the third period, the Bobcats actually outscored Tulsa, 15-14.

After shutting out Tulsa for the first 29 minutes, the Bobcat's lead of 3-0 disappeared as the Hurricane offense awoke. With 1:01 left in the second quarter, Eric Richardson's 1-yard touchdown run ended a 10-play 42 yard drive and gave Tulsa a 7-3 halftime lead.

Just 30 seconds into the second half, Tulsa struck again on Richardson's 7-yard touchdown run for the 14-3 lead. Tulsa scored on its first four possessions of the third quarter.

Texas State managed to hang with Tulsa with 24 first downs to 27 but got out-gained 530 yards to 381.

Game four vs. UC Davis

SAN MARCOS, Texas --- Texas State won a big game over a quality UC Davis team by a 34-32 score, led by a 28-of-43 passing effort from Barrick Nealy. The sophomore threw for 384 yards, the second best single game passing mark in school history.

K.R. Carpenter led the way with nine grabs for 83 yards, while three others -- John Tyson, Kenny Samuels and Antoine Harden -- each had five receptions. Terrell Harris had 18 rushes for 90 yards and a score, while Walter Musgrove led the way with nine tackles.

UC Davis struck first, driving 74 yards on nine plays for a 7-0 lead in the first. The Aggies scored again after a Bobcat fumble resulted in a 31-yard return by UC Davis' Justin Patterson.

Dietz tied the score at 13-all with a career-best 46-yard field goal in the second, but the Aggies responded and led 23-13 at the break.

In the second half, Harris scored from 12 yards and Nealy hit Tyson from 18 yards to sandwich around a Apocotos 49-yard field to give Texas State a 27-26 advantage. Nealy then found Smith on a 62-yard completion for the final Bobcat score of the game with nine minutes remaining in play. UC Davis scored with 5:45 left but failed on the two-point try.

Game eight vs. Northwestern St

SAN MARCOS, Texas --- Texas State dropped its Homecoming game and Southland Conference opener to Northwestern State, 49-19, here Saturday night.

The Demon defense, ranked third in all of I-AA football, held the Bobcats to just 65 yards of total offense in the first three quarters.

It's not that the Bobcats didn't have chances, though. Texas State (3-5, 0-1) drove into the Northwestern State redzone twice in the first period, only to come away with three points on a Steven Dietz 37-yard field goal at :13 left in the first quarter. Dietz had a 37-yard try blocked midway through the first.

The Demons answered with a pair of scoring run by Davon Vinson, from three and one yard out as Northwestern State took a 14-3 lead into halftime.

The final score of 31-13 made the game seem one sided, but it was anything but that. It was a night where the Bobcats out-gained Nicholls 485 yards to 243 and had nearly twice as many first downs, 29-15.

Safety Harold Watson, playing in his final game as a Bobcat, had four tackles, but more importantly, scooped up a Sam Houston fumble with four minutes left in the third quarter and ran it in 16 yards for a score, giving the 'Cats a 28-14 lead, one they would never give back.

Terrell Harris rushed for a career-best 246 yards on 28 carries, sixth place on the all-time single game list. Barrick Nealy was 14 of 24 for 200 yards and ran for three scores. And, sophomore K.R. Carpenter caught six passes for 59 yards, breaking the single-season record for receptions with 60. He broke the mark held by Johnny Parker (59 in 1970). SHSU tied the score just before half with a score and two-point conversion. In the second half, Texas State scored two touchdowns in a seven second span as Nealy scored from four yards out and that was followed by Watson's big play. After Sam Houston made it 28-21, Nealy scored for the third time, this one from one-yard out, Morris Brothers scored from 32 yards out, and Harris from eight yards out.

Now in its fourth decade of existence, the Southland Conference was formed on March 15, 1963, when administrators from Abilene Christian College, Arkansas State College, Arlington State College, Lamar State College of Technology and Trinity University met at the Baker Hotel in Dallas.

In its four decades of academic and athletic accomplishments, the Southland Conference has witnessed many changes in college athletics, and the league has adjusted and transformed as necessary to continue to achieve at the highest competitive levels.

Current Southland Conference members in Texas and Louisiana include Lamar University, McNeese State University, Nicholls State University, Northwestern State University, Sam Houston State University, Southeastern Louisiana University, Stephen F. Austin State University, Texas State University, the University of Louisiana at Monroe, the University of Texas at Arlington, and the University of Texas at San Antonio.

All told, the member institutions of the Southland encompass over 150,000 current students and an alumni base of close to 700,000. Famous alums from Southland Conference schools include former U.S. President Lyndon B. Johnson (Texas State), CBS news anchor Dan Rather (Sam Houston State), U.S. Central Command general Tommy Franks (UT-Arlington), NBA executive Joe Dumars (McNeese State), ABC news and sports anchor Robin Roberts (Southeastern Louisiana), country music stars Tim McGraw (UL-Monroe) and George Strait (Texas State), Major League Baseball star and Olympian Ben Sheets (UL-Monroe), and actor Lou Diamond Phillips (UT-Arlington).

The cities of the Southland are diverse and dynamic, ranging from international business and cultural centers such as the Dallas/Fort Worth metroplex and San Antonio, to the historical cities of Nacogdoches, Texas, and Natchitoches, La., to the home of the modern oil boom, Beaumont, Texas, to the unique Cajun French cultures found in the Louisiana cities of Thibodaux and Lake Charles. Southland Conference institutions also draw large numbers of students from the metropolitan areas of Houston, New Orleans, Austin and Shreveport.

The Southland sponsors 17 championship sports, all at the NCAA Division I level. The eight men's sports include football, basketball, baseball, golf, tennis, cross country, and indoor and outdoor track and field. The women compete for nine championships in basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, golf, tennis, cross country, and indoor and outdoor track and field. The Conference earns automatic qualification to NCAA championships in football, men's and women's basketball, baseball, softball, volleyball, men's golf, women's tennis, and women's soccer.

Southland Conference football ranks among the best Division I-AA leagues in the nation, and enjoys an annual expectation of competing for the national championship with multiple teams advancing to the NCAA playoffs each year. Two years ago, McNeese State finished the regular season ranked No. 1 in the nation, and advanced to the national championship contest, the sixth such title game appearance since the league joined I-AA in 1982. All told, Southland teams have played in 78 Division I-AA playoff games in 21 years, winning 38 of the contests.

Historically, the Southland's successful football heritage has sustained itself through numerous membership and classification changes. Originally an NAIA conference, the Southland joined the NCAA College Division in 1968. The College Division was renamed NCAA Division II in 1973, and the league played two seasons in that class.

The Southland was an NCAA Division I league from 1975-81, before joining the ranks of I-AA in 1982, its home ever since.

The Conference can lay claim to five national championships, including College Division championships through former members Arkansas State (1970, UPI) and Louisiana Tech (1972, National Football Foundation).

Louisiana Tech also won the first-ever NCAA-sanctioned

national title, winning the Division II playoffs in 1973. Tech followed that with the UPI's Division II national championship in 1974. Louisiana-Monroe won the 1987 Division I-AA national title.

McNeese State, which has made 11 appearances in the national playoffs, also played in the 1997 I-AA national championship game, and Stephen F. Austin played in the 1989 title game, one of four playoff runs for the Lumberjacks. Northwestern State has played in five national playoffs, and advanced to the semifinals in 1998, while Sam Houston State has earned three trips to the postseason.

On four occasions, the Southland has placed three teams in the national 16-team playoffs. Five of the six current football-playing members have qualified for the I-AA playoffs, and Texas State won NCAA Division II titles in 1981 and 1982 before joining the Southland.

During its tenure as a Division I conference from 1975-81, the Southland Conference was instrumental in the startup of the Independence Bowl in 1976. The Southland representative served as the host team of the bowl until 1980, compiling a 2-3 record in the contests.

The Southland has produced over 130 football All-Americans during its history, and has sent such talent to the professional ranks including San Francisco's Zack Bronson (McNeese), Buffalo's Larry Centers (SFA), Carolina's Kavika Pittman (McNeese), Kansas City's Marcus Spears (Northwestern), Houston's Darrick Vaughn (Texas State), Washington's Jeremiah Trotter (SFA) and Oakland's Terrance Shaw (SFA). In the 2002 NFL Draft alone, five Southland players were selected.

Former NFL stars from the Southland include Fred Dean, Bill Bergey, Stan Humphries, Fred Barnett, Roger Carr, Marvin Upshaw, Mike Barber, Bruce Collie, Tim McKyer, Pat Tilley, Jackie Harris, Eugene Seale, Bubby Brister, Billy Ryckman, Rafael Septien, Buford Jordan and Ray Brown.

The Southland has also seen its share of great coaches during its history such as Maxie Lambright, Ernie Duplechin, Sam Goodwin, Jack Doland, Bennie Ellender, Bobby Keasler, Larry Lacewell, Bill Davidson, Dennis Franchione, Pat Collins and Ron Randleman.

The Southland has repeatedly demonstrated its commitment to the academic and athletic success of its student-athletes.

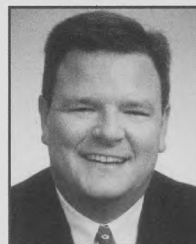
With the F.L. McDonald Postgraduate Scholarship Award, the league annually honors one male and one female scholar-athlete with a stipend for postgraduate study. The Scholar-Athlete Award is given to each institution's male and female student-athlete with the highest grade-point average. Also, student-athletes with grade point averages above 3.0 are honored on the league's All-Academic teams.

In addition to providing expanding opportunities for student-athletes, the Southland Conference and its member institutions are very involved in various community outreach programs. Many of these programs provide positive life skills training such as academics, citizenship and leadership to school-aged students in Southland communities.

The Southland Conference has also been active in the NCAA Youth Education through Sports (YES) program, and is committed to providing thousands of youngsters the opportunity to receive instruction from Southland student-athletes and coaches in numerous YES clinics.

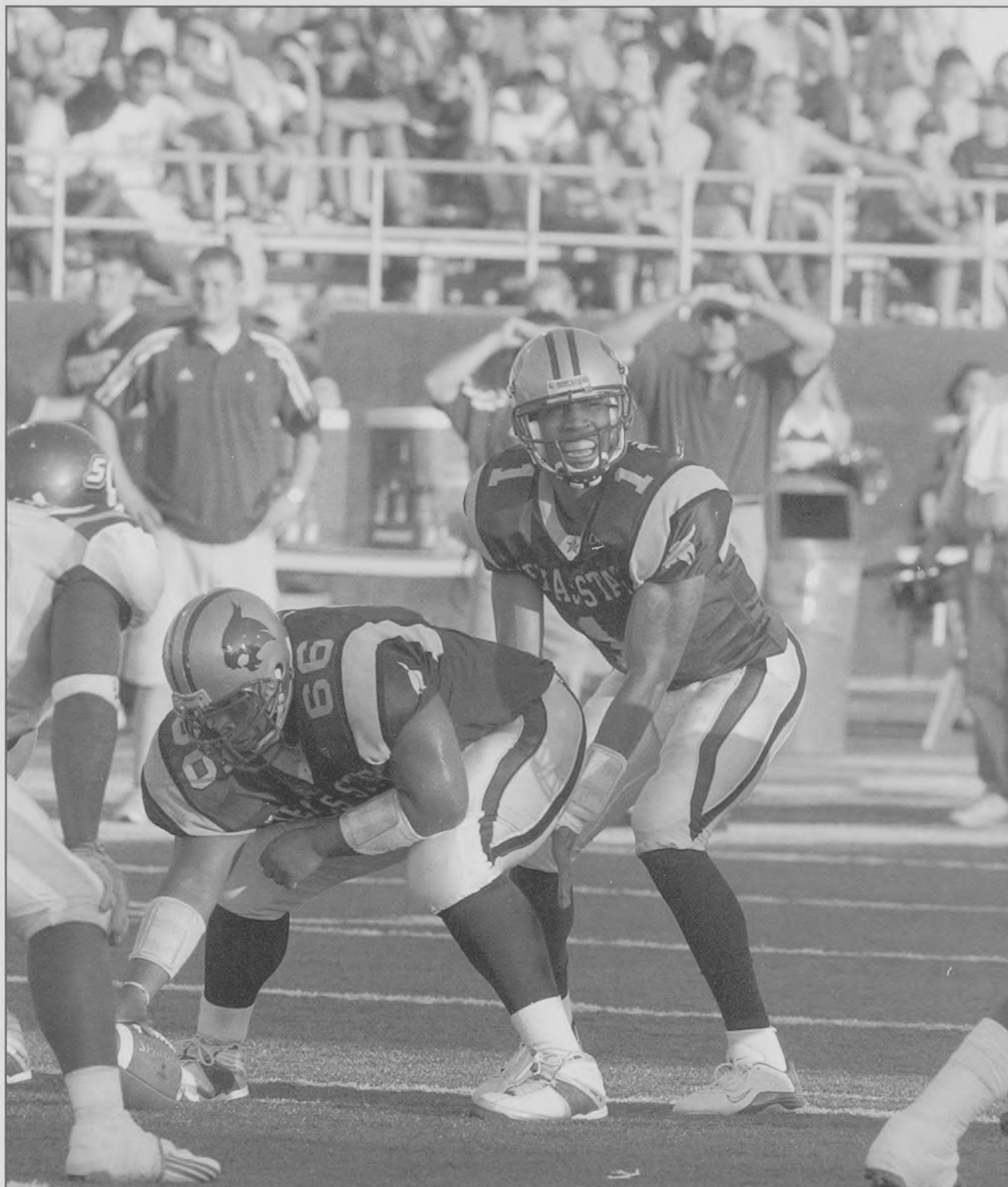

THE RECORDS



jim wacker field at bobcat stadium

Bobcat Stadium, home to the Texas State University football team since 1981, remains one of the finest playing facilities in the Southland Conference and in the southwest.

And the facility name was changed to Jim Wacker Field at Bobcat Stadium last fall, honoring the former head football coach and athleti director of the Bobcats.

The playing surface is the Astro Play® artificial turf, a new concept in filled turf systems - a grass-like, non-abrasive, polyethylene fiber matrix filled with special rubber or rubber/sand granules. AstroPlay® is carefully engineered to offer the best aspects of natural grass without the inherent drawbacks such as high maintenance, low use levels, game cancellations and uneven footing. AstroPlay is made by Southwest Recreational Industries, Inc.

The capacity of the semi-bern stadium is 15,218 with the west side featuring a 50-yard long, 5,000 square foot press and booster facility. The press box has

seating for more than 50 working media. It contains a special President's Box, coaching booths for both teams, two radio booths, the public address booth, and men's and women's restrooms. In addition, a filming deck and a television box are provided on the second level.

The new end zone complex in the south end of Bobcat Stadium houses all football and track and field operations, including a weight room, training room, locker rooms, meeting rooms, and coaching offices. The facility also has a large Hall of Honor banquet room for various functions.

The stadium's scoreboard, furnished by Coca-Cola and manufactured by Daktronics of Brookings, S. D. features a Venus 4600 three-line color message center and a Dean Dodge sound system. The board has eight permanent illuminated advertising panels and six other advertising opportunities on two tri-vision panels. Lighting, furnished by Wide-Lite of San Marcos, produces 120,000 watts from

four 120-foot poles.

The track was resurfaced in 2002 by Southwest Recreational Industries, Inc., featuring EUROTAN® WS, a paved-in-place, structurally sprayed polyurethane surface that is tough and durable.

Construction on Bobcat Stadium was started in 1979 and completed in August of 1981. The project also included the demolition of Evans Stadium and the addition of more than 2,000 parking spaces. The stadium was designed by Lockwood, Andrews & Newman of Houston and built by Kunz Construction Co. of San Antonio.

Bobcat Stadium is a multi-use facility, hosting events as diverse as the Texas Special Olympics to a Houston Oilers intrasquad game. It has been the home to the San Antonio Riders of the World Football League and to numerous other special events, including high school regular season and playoff games.

McALLEN, TEXAS -- Southwest Texas dominated North Dakota State 42-13 to give the Bobcats their first national football championship and capped what is arguably the school's finest season.

Domination was the key all season long and the Division II national championship game on December 12 was no different as SWT finished the season with a 13-1 record.

North Dakota State scored the game's first touchdown, but SWT roared back for 14 points in the second, third, and fourth quarters. With a 14-13 halftime lead, the Bobcats broke open the game on two bombs from Mike Miller, the game's MVP. Miller, a senior All-American quarterback, hit flanker David Vela with a 64-yard strike with 5:32 left in the third period, then hit slot back Vaughn Deary on a 44-yard pass with just 31 seconds remaining in the same period for a 28-13 margin.

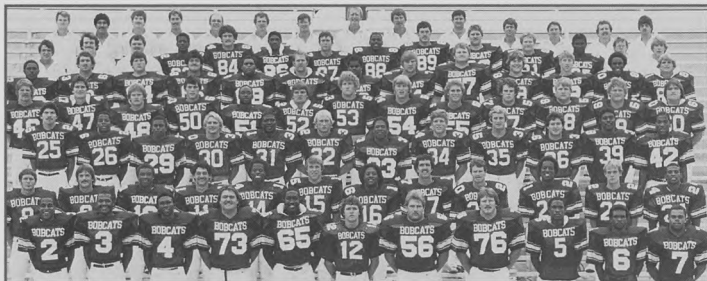
Tailback Donnie Williams and reserve quarterback Ron Jacoby each scored from two yards out in the final period to provide the final score. SWT accounted for 526 yards in total offense (328 rushing and 198 passing) while Miller accounted for 272 yards of total offense by himself. Williams was the game's leading rusher with 153 yards.

McALLEN, TEXAS -- Southwest Texas became the first school to win back-to-back Division II national championships with a 34-9 victory over the University of California-Davis.

The win ended a perfect season for SWT at 14-0 and also marked the last game for Jim Wacker as the Bobcats' head coach. Two weeks earlier, Wacker accepted an offer to become head coach of Texas Christian University.

The Bobcats left little doubt about Wacker's going away present, scoring 13 second period points to erase an early 3-0 deficit. Tailback Eric Cobble got the 'Cats on the board with a two-yard run early in the second period and SWT never looked back. The Bobcats added scores by Dale Posey, on a four-yard pass from Ron Jacoby, two Ricky Sanders' touchdown runs, from one and 13 yards, and another Cobble scoring run.

Sanders finished the game with 104 yards rushing and 44 yards receiving to grab game MVP honors. SWT finished the game with 394 yards in total offense, while the Bobcat defense limited Cal-Davis to just 199 yards, only 18 via the rush.

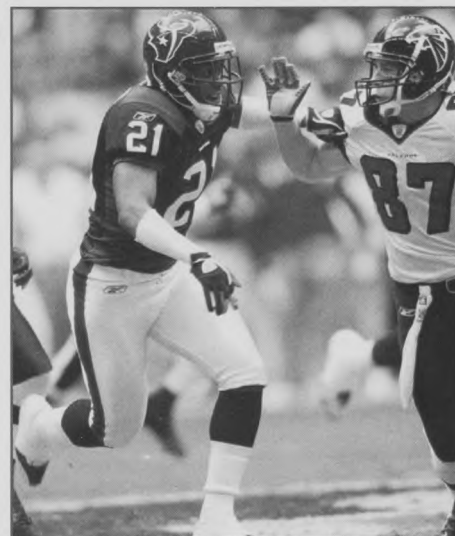

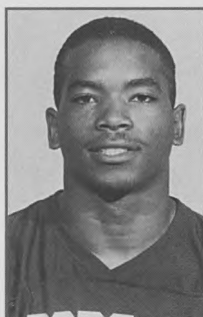

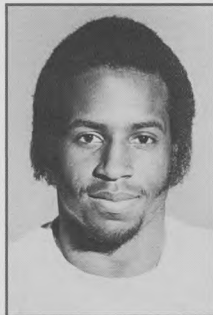
